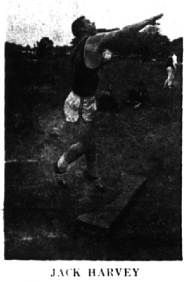

Four Local Teams Ready for Track Carnival

The area's biggest track and field carnival—the third annual All Oakland County Meet — is loaded with star-studded performers.

The all county attraction is a natural headliner. The preliminaries begin at 3 p.m. Saturday with the finals set for 8 p.m. at Southfield High School, Ten Mile and Lahser Road.

Seaholm, Bloomfield Hills, Brother Rice and Groves—have accepted invitations to the meet, which is expected to attract nearly 30 schools throughout the county.

Probably the biggest disappointment is Cranbrook School's decision not to compete in the meet. The school decided not to participate because of the final exams scheduled for Monday.

THE COMPETING schools will be shooting for one of the team trophies awarded to the five top

teams. Individuals will vie for medals awarded to the first six places in each event.

Waterford won the team title in 1960 and Pontiac Central copped the honors last year.

Three records might fall as the field attempts to better marks established in the 15 events.

Dorie Reid, Ferndale speedy dashman, is expected to lower his 100-yard dash mark of 10.0 set in 1960. Already he has been clocked in 9.6 for the century.

Reid should smash the 220 mark of :22.0 set last year. He ran the

220 in :22.1 in the regionals with a pulled leg muscle.

SEAHOLM'S 880-YARD relay record time of 1:31.5 could be shattered by Bloomfield Hills' speedy foursome of John Schweppe, Fritz Stresen-Reuter, Dave Noyes and Roger Stewart. This quartet already has posted a record 1:31.7 at the Central Michigan University Relays.

The local hopes will be riding with Seaholm and Bloomfield Hills. Both teams sport a talented line-up which could give Pontiac

Central, pre-meet favorite, some anxious and troublesome moments.

THE MAPLES are perennial rulers of the Eastern Michigan League. They have won the league crown nine straight years and will attempt to make it ten in a row Tuesday at Hazel Park.

Coach Don Hoff's Barons should give added prestige to the local area. The Barons successfully defended their Wayne-Oakland County track title May 22.

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THE HURDLES events should provide some added excitement with Art Tregenza and Ted Barnett, of Bloomfield Hills, Carter Dinkeloo, of Seaholm, and Bob Vihbert, of Groves.

The 100 and 220 dashes should be the sole-property of Ferndale's Reid. However, Bloomfield Hills (See CARNIVAL, 4-E)

gained only four points as Dave Noyes

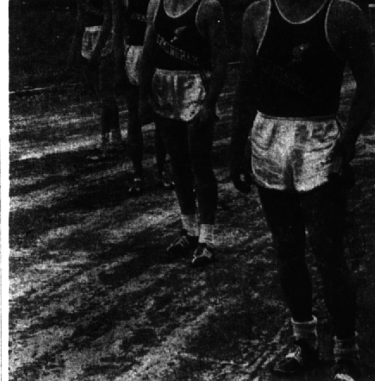
Cranbrook Wins Seventh League Crown

Speedy Barney Crouse, a champion dashman, won three events and set a school record in the 100 to spark Cranbrook School to its seventh consecutive Interstate Preparatory track championship at Cleveland, Ohio Saturday.

Crouse, state Class B 220-yard

champion in 1960 and 1961; hit the tape in 9.9 seconds to win the 100, ran the 220 in :21.7 and recorded a leap of 20 1/4" to take the broad jump. He also anchored the winning 880 relay team.

ESSEL BAILEY "flew" over the hurdles in :15.8 to copy the 120-yard low hurdles.

Jess Brewer picked up a 61th and second in the high and low hurdles, respectively.

Bob Hicks was second in the 440 dash and third in the 100. Bill McMullen and Bob Fritz ran two-three in the mile; Brit Gordon, Jeff Walters and Norm Lee were second, fourth and fifth, respectively in the 880; Boy Boye was fourth in the 220; Steve Early was 61th in the broad jump; Linn Hobbs and Bob Parsons were in a three-way deadlock for second in the high jump.

SEAHOLM HIGH slipped to 12th place in the state Class A finals at Ann Arbor. The Maples had 10 points.

Miler Jack Bachelier ran his best time of 4:28.0 for a third place. The time smashed the existing school mark. Bachelier also was the winner of the Bucky Zoellin Memorial award for the most points in the state competition. Rick Reid

Bloomfield Hills roared to its second straight Wayne-Oakland County track championship May 22 at Milford.

The power-laden Barons clinched their crown with power in the dashes and distance events.

Coach Don Hoff's crew rolled up 82 points, Milford 51, Clarencville 26, Northville 24, Holly 8, West Bloomfield 6 and Clarkston one. Brighton did not enter the meet.

ART TREGENZA paced the Barons with 18 points on first in both hurdles and the broad jump and a third in the high jump.

B'ham's Geiss Cards 297; Kocsis Captures Sixth Title

Birmingham's Jack Geiss, rated one of the state's top 10 amateurs, fired a fine 297 total in the 72-hole Michigan Medal Golf play tournament at the Birmingham Country Club last weekend.

However, the stocky-built Geiss finished in a two-way tie for fourth place.

But the incomparable Chuck Kocsis, the finest amateur ever produced in Michigan, captured his sixth title in the last six years.

KOCSIS, who has made this tournament a monopoly, added a par 71 to earlier rounds of 70-68-72 for a 281 total, three under par, that gave him a 10-stroke victory and a perfect record in the Medal Play.

He is a finely-polished golfer who doesn't make many mistakes with his irons or putter. His style of play involves being in the fairway consistently and on the green in regulation.

equals his total of Michigan Amateur championships. And he's won the Michigan Open three times and represented the United States on the Walker Cup team in 1938, 1949 and 1967.

GEISS carded an opening 18 hole total of par 71 but then shot a 74 in the afternoon round Friday. He got another 74 Saturday and then went seven over par Sunday with a 78.

Finishing behind Kocsis was Glenn Johnson, Grosse Ile, with 291; Sam Kocsis, Chuck's brother, 292; Mike Andonian, Sylvan Glen, 292; Mike Molenda and Geiss at 297.
