

Four Injured In 2-Car Crash

Four people were injured Monday evening in a two-car accident at Quanton and Lahser roads. In satisfactory condition Wednesday morning in William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak, are Robert Edward Barnett, 35, with a concussion, Lula Michels, 2, with a broken rib, and Rose Michels, 4, with a broken left hip and facial cuts. All three are from Royal Oak.

TREATED AND released from Beaumont Hospital was June Kopta of 710 Oakleigh, Bloomfield Hills. The accident occurred shortly before 5 p. m. when the car driven by Barnett, headed west on Quanton, collided with the car driven by Mrs. Kopta in the middle of the intersection. The two Michels girls were passengers in Barnett's car. No tickets were issued.

City Approves Three Zoning Law Changes

Several changes in Birmingham's zoning ordinance won city commission approval Monday night following a public hearing. All except one were approved by unanimous vote.

The sole exception was a provision requiring walls of face brick for screening in parking lots. Commissioners Carl F. Ingraham and Ralph A. Main voted against that amendment.

The ordinance as changed now says that screening along a street line shall consist of "an unpaired capped wall with an exterior of face brick adjacent to the street." Along other than the street, it calls for "an unpaired wall of wood or capped masonry."

INGRAHAM and Main have argued that requiring face brick would be "too restrictive" for property owners. They felt that it would be unreasonable for the commission to make such a demand of the owners.

Other commissioners argued, however, that the face brick requirement in the municipal lots and thus would not be too much to expect from others.

Another amendment affects the placement of state-licensed trailer camps in the city, restricting them to areas zoned for B-2 neighborhood business. Previously, they were not limited to any specifically zoned areas.

A THIRD decision was that outdoor amusement and recreational facilities be restricted to B-3 community business zones. The changes in the zoning ordinance came up as a result of the city's codification (modernizing and simplifying) of its ordinances. Proposed zoning changes require public hearing.

Shroder Appointed Aide to New York Office for Aging

Jerry A. Shroder, 36, son of Mrs. Ralph S. Shroder, 2100 S. Cranbrook Road, Birmingham, has been appointed the first Deputy Administrator of the New York State Office for the Aging. He will be responsible for the coordination, stimulation and promotion of further services for the aging in the greater New York metropolitan area.

Born in Detroit, Shroder received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Princeton University in 1949, graduating Cum Laude from the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs. He received his Master's degree in social welfare from the University of Michigan in 1951, majoring in community organization.

Shroder's most recent position was as Consultant on Teaching Materials for the Council on Social Work Education for which he acted as first director of the Council's Project on Teaching Materials in the Field of the Aging.

POSITIONS PREVIOUSLY held by Shroder include Managing Director of the Community Chest of Pontiac, Michigan, and Assistant Director of the Pontiac Area United Fund; Associate Secretary of the Council of Social Agencies of Flint and Genesee counties, Michigan, and Executive Secretary of the Council of Social Agencies of South Bend-Mishawaka area.

Among the published materials written by Shroder are "Mennen Williams: A Profile," in New Century, a Princeton University publication, and "Midcentury Conference on Children and Youth," in Child Welfare World, a Michigan American Legion publication.

Troy School Bus Crash Injures Nine

Six victims remain hospitalized from injuries incurred in the Monday afternoon head-on collision of a school bus and a car on E. Maple near Eastport in Troy.

Six students returning home from special classes for handicapped children at the Poppleton Elementary School, 1480 W. Big Beaver Road, Troy Township, were injured as were the bus driver and two occupants of the car. Mrs. Leeta Grapport, 55, wife of Troy Police Chief David E. Grapport, and driver of the special panel truck-type bus, received severe chest injuries and scalp lacerations and remains in very critical condition in the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac.

THE BUS was traveling east on E. Maple when it was struck head-on by a car driven by Mrs. Hazel Powers, 15, of 807 Bywood, Clawson. Mrs. Powers, an expectant mother, told police the car ahead of her suddenly slammed on its brakes and swerved to the right. She said she cut to the left to avoid hitting the car ahead of her and in doing so cut into the left lane of the two-lane highway, striking the bus.

The collision occurred with such force that Michael Cook, 15, of 850 Hartland, Troy, was thrown through the windshield of the bus and landed on the hood. He is in fair condition at William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak.

Several other boys were tossed out the side doors of the bus when it spun around after being hit. Others hospitalized are now considered in fair condition. They are: John Baswell, 11, of 3820 Houghton, Troy, who had head injuries; Beverly Berry, 19, of 325 Elmwood, Clawson, a passenger in the car, who suffered scalp lacerations; and Richard Thorne, 10, of 2488 Daleford, Troy, who received head injuries and chin lacerations.

Robert Frasure, 15, of 3112 John R. Troy, received bruises, and Steve Jankowski, 8, of 5001 Wright, Troy, suffered contusions

of the left thigh. They were treated and released.

MRS. POWERS was admitted to St. Joseph Hospital where she was treated for compound fractures of the right leg and facial lacerations. She is in fair condition. James Vodka, 10, of 531 Sylvanwood, Troy, suffered bruises and was treated at St. Joseph's and released.

One bus driver had been dropped off at his home just before the accident. Mrs. Powers and Miss Berry were en route home from their jobs at the AMT Corp. in Troy.

Chairman Reports On Torch Drive In the County

Oakland County achieved 85.6 per cent of its quota by raising \$281,766 for the 1962 Torch Drive in 10 days preceding the annual Community Campaigns luncheon. Mrs. Clyde C. Bennett Jr., of 1274 Westwood, Birmingham, county chairman, said that residential solicitors raised \$249,018 in their competition for the coveted "sugar bowl" and that community business, competing for a new trophy, a "Town Crier's" bell, raised \$32,855, or 66 per cent of quota.

One team of solicitors in the Birmingham-Bloomfield-Franklin region, the Franklin residential division, raised \$8,040, which was \$1,032 over its quota.

MRS. BENNETT made her report before 600 volunteers, mostly women, at the annual Community Campaigns luncheon in Detroit. The drive is raising \$18,500,000 for the 1962 budgets of 135 local, state, and national health and community services.

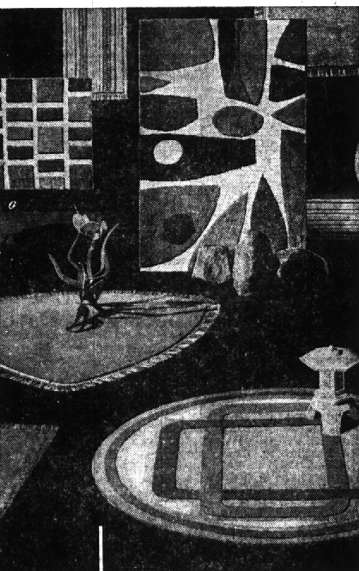
