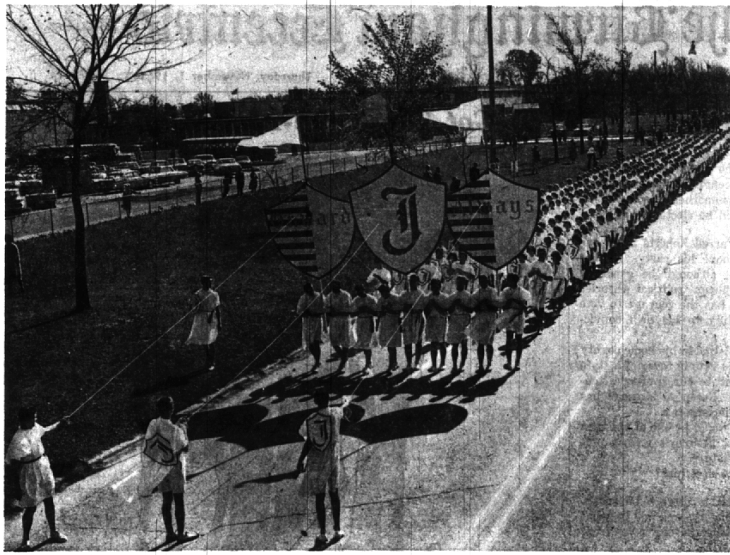

For the first time since 1958 and THE SOPHOMORES surprised the fifth time in history, the Juniors class at Seaholm High School has won the annual Field Day competition.

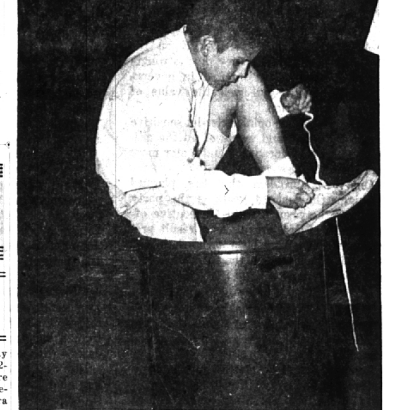
