Jack Turner, veteran Indianapolis Motor Speedway driver, spoke to students at Groves, Oct. 25 on "Highway Safety Is No Accident". **B'ham Hi-Twelve Treated to GM Science Preview**

Eighty-five members of the Birmingham Hi-Twelve club were treated to a special kind of show business at their October 22 meeting. "Previews of Progress"—General Motors science show—appeared before the group in answer to a special request by Bill Burlingame, October program chairman. A non-commercial show, "Previews" has been seen by over 30-million students and adults in the United States, Canada and 22 foreign countries. Last year many of the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills high school students saw the show as an assembly program for the entire student bodies of several schools here.

"We seek through 'Previews' to inspire more young people to make science and engineering their career and provide the trained talent America must have to keep pace with the bright promise of the future," John F. Gordon, president of General Motors, declares.

THE LATEST version of the 45-minute stage show includes nine different sequences. Designed to show some of the many contributions of research and technology to modern living, the exciting demonstrations were narrated in non-technical language by a specially-trained two-man team. The two men who appeared here with the

show were Bill Winters and Ted Morand, of General Motors Public Relations staff. A model car powered by sunlight, a roaring jet engine and the Ground Effect Machine, a vehicle that skims over land or water, were a few of the dramatic parts of the fast-moving science show. Seven "Previews" units take the program to all sections of the country. Audiences have ranged from groups of 100 to crowds of six thousand. In the true tradition of show business, "Previews" has been staged under a variety of conditions. It has been presented on the platforms of stake trucks in rural areas and on the Starlight Roof of the Waldorf Astoria.
