

'Let Us Build a Church'—Pine Hill

After two years of temporary meeting places, Pine Hill Congregational Church members are to have a permanent, modern place of worship. Actual construction on the building will begin about mid-November. The general design of the structure is contemporary while retaining a feeling of Colonial architecture. Built of white brick, the building will be two-story, containing a kitchen and a large fellowship

hall and classrooms on the lower level and a chapel on the second floor. The building will be located on seven acres of ground on Middlebelt Road, one-half mile south of Long Lake Road. 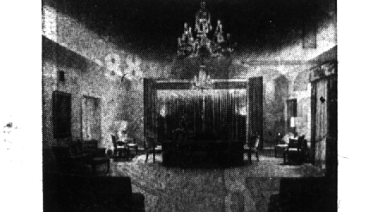
