**CON-CON REPORT**

**Government to Follow an 'Open Door' Policy**

Easier access to information about governmental affairs is a noteworthy improvement incorporated in several new or revised sections of the proposed Michigan constitution which voters will be asked to pass judgment upon next April 1.

Unlike most other such gatherings in the history of this country, the recent Michigan Constitutional convention and committee meetings, in a "goldfish bowl". The public and news media were welcomed at all sessions of the convention and its numerous committee meetings.

This was an abrupt departure from the constitution-making process that has usually followed in this country since the Federal constitution was adopted behind closed doors in 1787.

**THE DELEGATES** to the Michigan convention determined early in their deliberations that they wanted to operate in full public view. Representatives of the various news media did a thorough job of objective reporting of daily convention and committee sessions.

The importance that delegates attached to public information about their own activities is reflected in their concern for easier access to information about governmental affairs in general.

A significant break-through in eliminating secrecy in legislative committee matters is a new section in the Article dealing with the legislative branch which specifies: "On all action on bills and resolutions in each committee, names and votes of members shall be recorded. Such vote shall be available for public inspection."

The same new section further provides that notice of all committee hearings and "a clear statement of all subjects to be considered at each hearing" must be published in the journal in advance of the hearing.

The proposed new document also opens to the public by constitutional mandate formal sessions of governing boards of state-supported colleges and universities. Until recent years, the public was not admitted to sessions of these governing boards.

**NOW THE PUBLIC** and representatives of news media attend only by invitation. The new constitution, if approved by the voters, would recognize the right of the public to be present at such meetings.

In the area of local government, a new section in the proposed constitution requires that local units empowered to prepare budgets of estimated expenditures and revenues cannot adopt them until after a public hearing. This restriction would apply to counties, townships, cities, villages and school districts.

The new constitution would preserve traditional guarantees of liberty of speech and press in these words from Section 5 of the Declaration of Rights: "Every person
