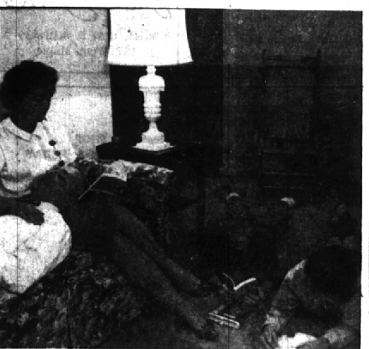
This Is the Letter That Pegged Our Homemaker Winner
