

## Set Christian Science Lecture

The importance of overcoming limitations will be brought out in a free public lecture to be given in Bloomfield Township Friday, by Ralph W. Cessna of Chicago.

Cessna is on extensive tour as a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship. He will speak under the auspices of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Franklin, at Bloomfield Hills Junior High School, at 8 p.m. His subject will be "How Christian Science Removes Limitations."

A former newspaperman, Cessna was born in Battle Creek. He worked on newspapers in Michigan and Florida before joining The Christian Science Monitor in 1929. During World War II he was a captain in the United States Army and was a panel chairman with the War Labor Board in the Chicago area. In 1947 he entered the public practice of Christian Science. Five years later he became an authorized teacher of Christian Science.

# 'Fontane' Film to Preview Here

Tony Fontane, Hollywood singer, will appear in Birmingham for the preview showing of the film, "The Tony Fontane Story," at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 13, at First Presbyterian Church.

There is no admission charge and everyone in the Birmingham area is invited.

THE FILM will be shown in the social hall of the church, which is located at 1659 W. Maple Road, at Chesterfield. The film preview is sponsored in this area by the Men's Prayer Group of First Presbyterian.

"The Tony Fontane Story" is the true story of one of the world's greatest singers. Filmed in Hollywood by Youth Films, the teenage division of Gospel Films, Inc. it is the first Christian, dramatic musical every produced.

THE PURPOSE of this 79-minute, color production is to present Tony Fontane's personal testimony, showing to teenagers and adults alike how the answer to life and the hereafter is found in the person of Jesus Christ.

Fontane acquired nation-wide success when his hit record, "Cold, Cold Heart," sold more than a million copies. He recorded other hits including "Syncopeed Clock,"

"Bring Back the Thrill," and "Vanity".

Two of his most outstanding albums were "Showboat" recorded with Sophie Tucker, Patti Page, and Tony Martin; and "Sunny Side of the Street" recorded with Vic Damone, Frankie Lane, and Billie Daniels. His recording of "I Talked to the Trees" held first position on the Australian hit parade for 16 consecutive weeks.

FONTANE'S WIFE, the former Kerry Vaughn, was a professional actress when they were married 12 years ago. After their marriage, Kerry continued performing on the stage and in night clubs around the world and appearing in many Hollywood motion pictures.

It was a peaceful, sunny September afternoon in 1957 as Tony

Fontane, filled with the excitement and satisfaction of a successful rehearsal for a TV network show, was driving in the San Fernando Valley.

Suddenly there was an ear-splitting crash.

EVERYTHING WENT blank. Thirty days later, Tony regained consciousness. It was this automobile crash that brought Tony, Kerry, and their daughter, Char'ae, to a knowledge of Christ. They left their lucrative careers to enter full-time Christian work.

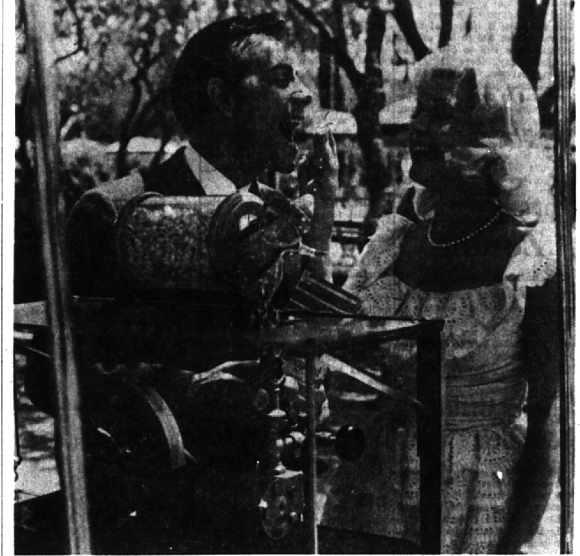
Tony and Kerry have dedicated their talents to the service of their Saviour and use these talents to portray themselves in the motion picture, R.C.A. Victor has recorded a souvenir album of the songs used in this motion picture, en-

titled "Songs from the Tony Fontane Story".

THE LINEAR on the back cover of the album was written by Dr. Billy Graham. A quote from that is as follows: "The Bible says, 'I will sing a new song.'"

Gospel Films, now in its 12th year, is operating in 82 countries of the world with films in 16 different foreign languages. Its teenage ministry, Youth Films, is the only Christian, motion picture company that offers free of charge its teenage films to any of the 38,000 high school assemblies throughout America.

"The Tony Fontane Story," while being premiered during November and December, will be available to churches and to civic groups in January of 1963.

## Medical Relief Crusader to be Guest Speaker

Mrs. Irene Auberlin, founder of World Medical Relief, Inc., will speak at the monthly luncheon meeting of the Episcopal Church Women of St. James Parish on Wednesday, Nov. 14.

Mrs. Auberlin, a 65-year-old Detroit housewife, started this worldwide project all on her own.

The whole idea for this project came about one night when she and her husband were watching a TV documentary about Korean orphans in 1953.

SHE BEGAN the next morning by collecting three barrels of diapers and children's clothing from her neighbors to be shipped to Korea. Later, when she discovered the orphanage in Korea was struggling to set up a clinic she enlisted the aid of doctors for supplies to equip a clinic.

Supplies came pouring into her home and to guarantee the businesslike operation of her project she rounded up a dozen business men and doctors to serve as a board of directors and formed the World Medical Relief, Inc.
