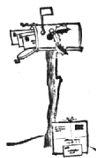

Local Upper Classmen Rally For College Advisory Night

Upper classmen from Cranbrook, Seaborn, Groves, Bloomfield Hills and Kingswood joined other upperclassmen from South Oakland high schools when they congregated at Berkeley High School Wednesday night to look, listen and perhaps take a private poll.

"Which college for me? John Hopkins or General Motors Institute? Vassar or Hope College? University of Chicago or Michigan State University? Which school can I get into and how about expenses?"

Mrs. John May and her committee from Birmingham Branch of AAUW served as hostesses for College Advisory Night.

The orientation programs at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. and the half-hour sessions which followed were planned to provide as much general and specific information about colleges as possible.

REPRESENTATIVES from most of the colleges and universities in Michigan had assigned rooms, along with others from

schools in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Virginia, Missouri, Wisconsin, New York, Maryland and Illinois.

The 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. general sessions started with an orientation program consisting of a panel discussion of the differences between types of schools and the questions most frequently asked by prospective college students and their parents.

Panel members from Berkeley high schools, July Epstein, David Stutz and Patricia Mazzarese, and Directors of Admissions Mr. Russell Wentworth from Michigan State University, Mr. Albert Timmer from Hope College and Mr. John Weibenga from Highland Park Junior College, were introduced by last year's College Advisory Night chairman, Mrs. Leiland Pence.

After an open question period, students and parents were free to gather information from as many of the following schools as time allowed.
