## Barons, Lakers Tie; To Share W-O Crown

It was a humdinger. In battling to a 19-19 tie Friday, Bloomfield Hills and West Bloomfield treated some 3,000 enthusiastic gridiron fans to a mixture of football thrills.

The game included fumbles . . . long runs . . . passes . . . interceptions . . . hard tackling . . . and a heated argument over who recovered a fumble in the last seconds of the contest.

One thing was decided, for sure. The Barons and Lakers will be co-champions of the Wayne-Oakland League . . . until next year. Both finished the season with identical 7-0-1 records.

NEITHER COACH was a completely happy about the outcome. Baron coach Don Hoff wished his team had made just one more extra point.

Laker mentor Art Paddy disputed a call by officials that gave the Hills possession of the football on the West Bloomfield one-yard line.

IT HAPPENED like this: Trailing 19-13, with about three minutes to play, the Barons had moved to the Laker seven-yard stripe. On the next play, fullback Pete Vidor carried the ball and fumbled on the one.

Two West Bloomfield players pounced on the ball. A second later, Bill Calhoun, playing end for the Barons, dove into the pileup.

WHEN OFFICIALS caught up with the play and unplugged griders

Calhoun had possession of the ball. On the next play, Roger Stewart crashed over for the touchdown that tied the score, 19-all. Stewart was stopped short as he tried for

QUARTERBACK Danny Greig, fullback John Nemyer and halfback Vaughn McGraw shared scoring honors for the Lakers.

A fumbled punt set up the Hill's first score in the initial period. Calhoun fell on the ball on the Laker 25 and on the next play Stewart passed to the flanker who took the ball away from three Laker defenders in the end zone.

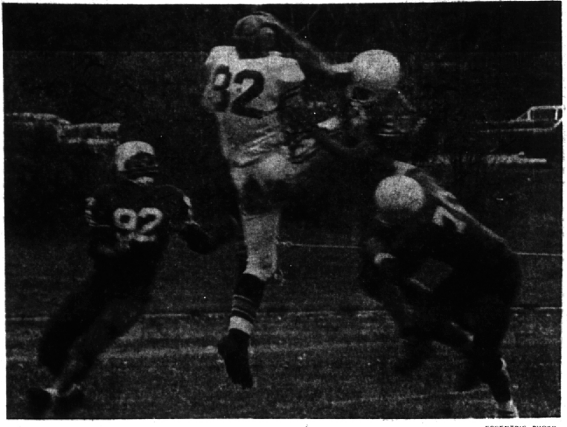
West Bloomfield retaliated in the second quarter, taking only seven plays to move 69 yards to tie up the game 6-6.

## Seaholm Finishes Sixth

The Birmingham Seaholm cross country team placed sixth in Class A competition with 11 other squads in the state championship run at Ypsilanti Saturday.

Bob Richards, speedster from Bloomfield Hills, placed second in the individual's race, only a few seconds behind Louis Scott of Detroit Eastern, who finished with a time of 9:48.4 to break the former mark of 9:50.9 set in 1960.

COUNTRY DAY placed 18th in Class C-D competition.

The sixth place effort marked the ninth year in a row the Maples have finished in the top seven of the state. They won the championship in 1958.

BILL SCHOEN paced the har-

riers as he came in 13th with a time of 10:37.3. Also running for the Maples were Tom Brooks, 22nd; Jim Olson, 32nd; Tim Maker, 48th; Jim Dennis, 49th; Dave Kennedy, 71st; and Bill Bachelier, 72nd.

Tom Hoopengardner, of Bloomfield Hills, came in 19th in the individual event.

Redford successfully defended their Class A championship, compiling 86 points to 122 for Flint Southwestern, the nearest contender.

SPARTA, WITH 156 points, won the Class B team event and Remus, with 55, outran the Class C-D competition.

Seaholm closed out Eastern Michigan League competition last week, posting a 15-49 win over Royal Oak Kimball.

Cranbrook bounced back from four straight defeats last Saturday and administered a sound thrashing to Western Reserve School of Ohio, 12-0. Victory was especially sweet to coach Pete Slater and his crew since the win kept the Cranes out of the Inter-State League cellar and spurred hopes of at least a .500 season.

THE REAL TEST of whether Cranbrook can wind up with a 4-4 record will come Saturday when they travel to Gatesville, O., for the finale with Gilmour Academy. The Cranes defeated the Ohio team last year, 14-8, but Slater figures "we'll have to play good football to beat them this year."

## B'field Riders Earn Ribbons At Horse Show

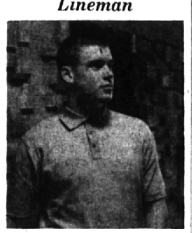

## Whew!...Maples Win A Squeaker

Paced by the running of halfbacks Bob Drotzler and Kent Heft, Seaholm Friday trounced by upset-minded Roseville, 19-13, and posted its seventh win of the year.

The game, however, was not without its anxious moments, as the Wildcats were bent upon adding the Maples to their list of defeated EML powers. Roseville the week before handed Ferndale its only loss of the season, 18-16.

Only two minutes had elapsed in the first quarter when Roseville took the lead, 7-0, by blocking a Seaholm punt on the 16. John Statman fell on the ball in the end zone. Tom Denny kicked the extra point.

THE MAPLES roared back in the second period, grinding out 65 yards in 13 plays. Drotzler and Heft assumed much of the running chores in the drive and it was Heft who skirted end for the final 15 yards for the touchdown. Brent Miller kicked the extra point to tie the contest at 7-all.

Seaholm took the kickoff to start the second half and in four plays had another six points.

FOLLOWING AN off-side penalty against Roseville that moved the ball to the Seaholm 38, Drotzler broke through a hole at right tackle and raced 68 yards to put the Maples in front, 13-7. Miller's kick was no good.

On the second play of the final stanza, Roseville once again took

advantage of a break to tie up the ball game.

DICK SWANEY, sophomore quarterback for the Maples, fading in a game by upset-minded Roseville linemen. In a wild attempt to get rid of the ball, he

threw it into the hands of John Pappas, who sprinted 98 yards for the TD. Again, the score was knotted—this time, 13-13.

Things were looking gloomy for the home team when Seaholm fumbled the ball on the ensuing kickoff and Roseville took over on the
