Little League Champs Named as Season Ends

Teams of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Little League closed out the 1962 season last week and there was a tie for first place in the varsity conference.

The Spartans and Tigers, with identical 5-1 records, will retire as co-champions, at least until next fall when they square off once more.

MUCH OF THE praise for the Spartans' performance goes to Bob Martin in his first year as coach in the Little League. Hank Kraetzer and Dr. Jim Pingel guided the Tigers, who were the champions in 1961.

The Browns wound up with a 2-4 record and the Wolverines finished at 0-6.

IN THE JUNIOR varsity race, the Gophers came up with an almost perfect 5-0-1 record to win the crown. They were followed by the Badgers (5-1) the Boiler-makers (5-1) the Buckeyes (3-1-2) the Indians (2-4) the Wildcats (1-4-1) the Hoosiers (1-5) and the Hawkweys (0-6).

Low Thistle, another newcomer to Little League, guided the Gophers to the championship.

IN WINDUP GAMES for the varsity, the Tigers defeated the Wolverines, 34-7 and the Spartans downed the Browns, 21-6.

Gar Thomas scored two touchdowns and Craig Heyl, Tom Ellis and Mike Hilkene got one each to account for the Tiger scoring; Bob Larkins scored the Wolverines' six

points on a 65-yard run.

SANDY HEAVENRIC, on a run of 85 yards, Rick Hale on a jaunt of 15 and Bud Price on a run of 45, sparked the Spartans to their fifth win. Bill Rose passed five yards to Bob Cornille for the Browns' score.

In junior varsity tilt: The Badgers edged the Wildcats, 6-0, by way of a 20-yard scoring cross-back by Jeff Watts late in the final period. The game ended with the Wildcats on the Badger three and threatening to tie it up.

THE GOPHERS nipped the Indians, 7-6, and the point after touchdown, on a run by Bob Moore, was the difference. The Gopher TD was scored by Tom Deyce on a three-yard plunge and the Indian tally was chalked up by John Bratton on a 10-yard sprint.

The Buckeyes downed the Hawkweys, 20-6, with Larry Obery scoring two of the winners' touchdowns. One came on a 60-yard runback of a kickoff and the other on a seven-yard effort. Ian Muir ran 12 yards for the other score and Bob Rozell scored from the two for the Hawkweys.

STEVE EYLER scored on runs of 40 and 45 yards to give the Boiler-makers a 13-0 victory over the Hoosiers. Rick Ficorelli added the extra point.

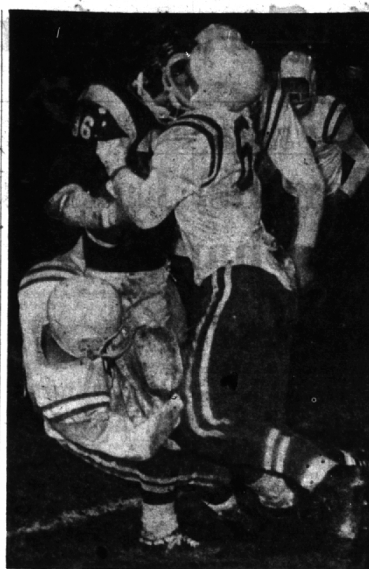
