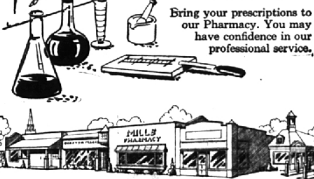
Announcement of the clubs and sponsors in this year's schedule is to take place this week. All the students are looking forward to this because of the enthusiasm and success of the clubs in the past.

Groves Falcons

Miss Malin's first and second hour civics classes conducted a timely, political, and scholastic program on Monday, Nov. 5, during the homeroom period. Students voted for the offices of governor, secretary of state, and congressman-at-large. It was announced the next day that George Romney had won in a landslide, defeating John B. Swainson and James Sim for governor. Norman Stockmeyer won the race for secretary of state by a close margin, while Alvin Bentley was elected congressman-at-large over Neil Staebler and Ralph Muncey.

On the Friday before the poll was taken over the newspaper, "The Scriber," gave a special description of each of the candidates, their platforms, and qualifications. This enabled the student body to give careful consideration to each candidate and to vote more intelligently during the vote election.

Groves' seventh grade class held its first primary election Wednesday morning, Oct. 31. Our youngest voters were elected during the homeroom period, elected as president, Bob Ruhle; vice president, Greg Eckle; secretary, Brook Berson; and treasurer, Craig Sutherland.

Tuesday, Nov. 13, parents of senior high students had the opportunity to see their son or daughter's teachers in action. The Open House began at 7:30 p.m., with parents following their child's schedule for the day, attending shortened versions of the regular classes. Honor Society members served as guides. Teachers presented information about the goals of the particular class, projects in which the students are involved, and the progress which the class is making. Tonight, again at 7:30 p.m., a similar Open House will be held for parents of junior high students. The purpose of an open house is fourfold; one, to help parents become better acquainted with teachers; two, to help them learn something of the curriculum; three, it enables parents to view our school in action; and four, they hear some of the problems of the school.

Speech students, English and Social Studies classes attended the second debate program of the year Monday, Nov. 5, during sixth hour. This debate, with the main issue being whether non-Communist nations could establish an economic community, was held in the Little Theater. Representing Augustana College in Illinois was their debate team which argued in the affirmative, while two students from Merchant Marine College in Long Island, N. Y., opposed them. The last fifteen minutes of the period were given over to an audience participation discussion.

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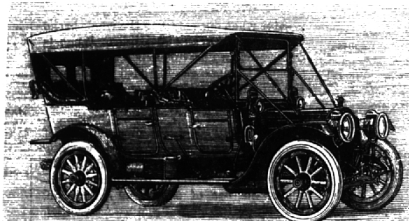
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
