Ever wish you could go through the whole day and not have a phone ring once? No calls asking you to bake cookies, help out on a committee, collect for a fund raising drive or plan a party.

Imagine what it would be like if the phone never rang and you waited day after day hoping someone anyone—even a salesman would call. Sound ridiculous? It isn't to a housewife whose family has just moved to a new community.

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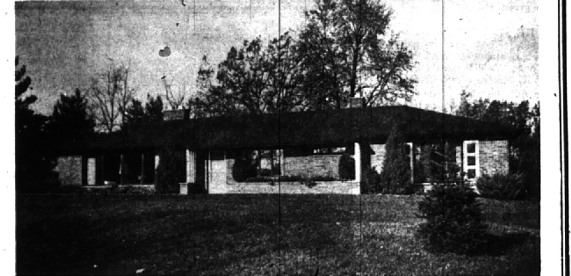
