first reading, reviewed a proposed zoning amendment for parts of Southfield and 12 Mile roads and decided to apply for federal aid on certain water system improvements.

A second reading must follow Monday night's first reading on rezoning five lots east of the A & P on 12 Mile Road from residential to commercial zoning.

A variance to permit use by a coin-operated dry cleaning business on the site would have to be considered separately at a later date by the zoning board of appeals. Dry cleaning service is then limited to pickup stations under the city's zoning ordinance.

A public hearing on the commercial zoning change was held Monday.

A 13-PAGE DRAFT of a proposed zoning amendment detailing zoning changes on Southfield and 12 Mile was worked upon by councilmen. The proposed changes would open much of the property along the two roads to specified types of commercial and professional use. Most of the land is presently zoned residential.

City Administrator Gerald Stone was authorized to apply for federal aid for improving two sections of the water system in Lathrup. The improvements include elimination of dead ends, repair and replacement of hydrants and defective valves.

offered. It is the only one produced locally in Oakland County.

PATTERSON Chevrolet were the local, second-lowest bidders benefiting from the commission's decision.

Commissioner William E. Roberts, who made the motion on the bids last week, offered a motion Monday night to allow Stark Hickey to cancel its successful bid—but a later withdrawal.

Commissioner Carl F. Ingraham said that on the two bids that went to the local merchants there was only a \$4 or \$5 difference between them and the out-of-town dealer.

THE SUPPOSITION was, he said, that with the difference being so small and the service more convenient by being local it would be more economical to the taxpayers to accept the local bids.

But in the bid that Stark Hickey did win the difference between it and the second low bid was \$110. This, Ingraham thought, might be too significant of a difference to warrant a change.

"I don't think we should allow them to withdraw," Ingraham declared, "when it would cost the City another \$110."

"I see no reason why just because he didn't win the one piece of equipment we should sacrifice \$110," Roberts withdrew his motion to grant withdrawal.

CITY MANAGER L. R. Gare said the "only question is a moral one." It takes merchant's time to prepare their bids, he explained, and in the past the City has normally accepted the low bid.

Ingraham, Roberts and Commissioner Robert Page agreed that the commission should formulate a more definite policy, especially in reference to "outside" bidders.

They requested a written report from Gare next week on what affects there might be from a policy of inviting bids only from local dealers.

The commissioners also agreed to keep the status quo as of last week, requiring delivery on the bids accepted.

Battle Arises Over Detroit's Fluoridation

A bitter fight appears to be taking shape this week as Detroit's Common Council began hearing arguments on fluoridation of the city's and metropolitan area's water supply.

All South Oakland communities use water supplied by Detroit and in 1963 Pontiac will also be included.

Birmingham has already endorsed the fluoridation proposal as has Clawson.

MORE THAN 400 persons filled the council chambers in Detroit Monday to hear the opening arguments.

Robert H. Grindlev, 4238 Meadow Lane, Bloomfield Township representing the Michigan Pure Water Association, attacked the validity of some organizations that have endorsed fluoridation. He charged that they were "interlocked" with the U.S. Health Department which lacks fluoridation.

He listed figures that showed the results of fluoridation in Grand Rapids. He charged that 20 percent of the children had mottled teeth since fluoridation began in 1955.

An attorney representing the Michigan State Dental Association, William Butler, told the gathering that no U.S. Court has upheld any argument against fluoridation.

Son of Troy Clerk Killed, Car Hits Tree

James L. Lockhart, son of Troy City Clerk J. Lawson Lockhart, was killed early Saturday morning when his car struck a tree.

Lockhart, 23, was dead on arrival at St. Joseph Hospital, Pontiac. The accident took place at 3:45 a.m. on Livernois north of 18 Mile Road, Troy.

Officers at the scene of the accident said Lockhart had apparently fallen asleep at the wheel. Tire marks indicated Lockhart's auto traveled 82 feet on the road shoulder before hitting the tree.

A 1957 GRADUATE of Troy High School, Lockhart was to have been an attendant at his sister Tamara's wedding Saturday.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in the Big Beaver Methodist Church with burial in Troy Union Corners Cemetery.

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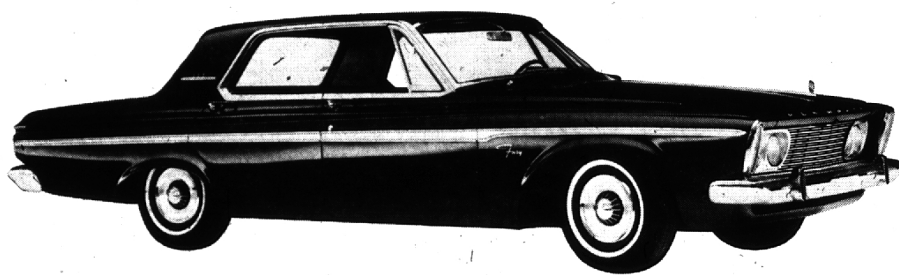
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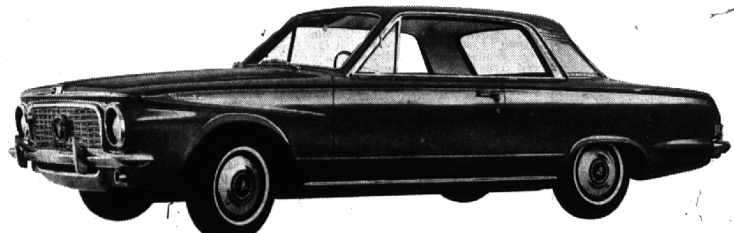
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
