

Dr. Dorsey to Speak

"Husbands" will be the topic of a talk by Dr. John M. Dorsey, M.D. of Wayne State University, at the Nov. 27 luncheon meeting of the Episcopal Churchwomen of Christ Church Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills.

He will be introduced by Nell McMath, a trustee of Cranbrook Foundation and a former vestryman of Christ Church.

DR. DORSEY'S TALK will emphasize the attitude that wives should take toward their husbands to assure a happy marriage. "Appreciation that a husband is always doing the best he can is the most constructive attitude for a wife to take," Dr. Dorsey said. "Realizing that he shaped his personality by his earlier life experiences is useful. Recognition that he 'lives his own wife' quite as she 'lives her own husband' can save many a heartache.

"Arguments are always traceable to the fact that each disputant is not talking about the same thing. If he were, there could not be any argument. All unhappiness, such as anger, resentment or jealousy, is traceable to hurt love."

DR. DORSEY WAS educated at the University of Iowa and did graduate study in Vienna. He was an associate professor of Psychiatry at the University of Michigan before coming to Wayne State.

Public Response Slow To Civil Defense Plans

When it comes to civil defense measures in Birmingham, one main point is quite evident: public apathy still exists.

For one thing, public response to Birmingham's intensified public information program has been quite low.

Very little is being done to build and equip either public or private shelters.

"It would appear," said John F. Saeffe, head of the local office of civil defense, "that we are no closer to being able to cope with and recover from the effects of a nuclear attack than we were six months ago."

"Yet," he emphasized, "progress is being made.

"More people, in and out of government, are thinking, seeking information and taking some preparatory actions."

SINCE THE outbreak of the Cuban crisis, public awareness seems to have increased.

But, said Saeffe in a report to the city commission, there still are problems.

"Regardless of what has gone before, the fact remains that there cannot be nuclear disaster preparedness without fallout shelters, and little is being done in this direction, if anything.

"Every discussion on nuclear disaster preparedness inevitably presumes the existence of adequate fallout shelters."

SAEFFE SAID that "interest in public courses of instruction available by attendance at current courses on medical emergency training and emergency welfare (disaster planning) remains extremely low.

"There is a general disinterest in accepting responsibility for participating in emergency welfare type organizations."

The similarity between Birmingham's "boom-fide" disaster warning sirens and volunteer fire sirens in neighboring communities continues to cause confusion, Saeffe reported.

ALTHOUGH the public may be doing almost nothing about civil defense, the City is doing something.

The police and fire departments have prepared their own emergency plan in accordance to the City's survival plan. Three other departments have prepared rough drafts.

A study on the feasibility of a City emergency operations center has been suspended pending developments on public shelters, Saeffe reported.

All of the city's firemen have been trained as monitors in the program for radiological defense.

Last year, "one additional eight-man rescue squad" was trained; but the ranks since have been decimated "for reasons beyond our control."

Saeffe said, "Intense efforts to recruit new members this year have produced only four trainees."

IT IS INTERESTING to note, too, that Chambers first turned his information on Hiss into the State Department in 1959 and that not only was nothing done—Hiss was secretary to Bretton Woods, advisor to FHR at Yalta, and secretary of the UN Conference at San Francisco.

It is even more interesting that Miss Bentley's testimony brought out that there were two other cells never exposed.

Miss Bentley: There was a third group that I knew of because of Mr. Hiss and there was another one that was mentioned to me by my Soviet contact without identifying it further.

Mr. Morris: "That is still a fourth group."

Miss Bentley: "Yes."

Mr. Morris: "And you know, as a matter of fact, that neither of these groups, as far as you know have been exposed to date."

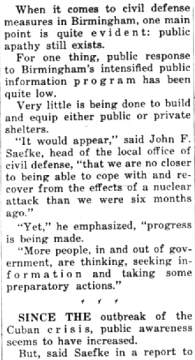
WOULD THIS explain some of our "blunder" in letting the agrarian reformers Mao Tse Tung and Fidel Castro take over China and Cuba?
