A tribute to the late Mrs. Mark Duffield is being planned by her associates, who this week announced plans for the Betty Duffield Planned Parenthood Clinic. Friends, volunteers and board members of the Planned Parenthood organization in both Wayne and Oakland counties met Monday at the Robinwood Drive home of Mrs. Fraser Pomeroy. There Mrs. Pomeroy, who is chairman of the project, led discussion of plans for the clinic. It will honor a woman who was for many years president of Planned Parenthood.

MRS. DUFFIELD, who died recently, "was a longstanding friend of Planned Parenthood and a dynamic community leader," said Mrs. Pomeroy. "It was through her inspiration," Mrs. Pomeroy said, "that so many Birmingham civic and social leaders became active in the Planned Parenthood organization. Mrs. Pomeroy said two small clinics are now in operation in Oakland County. The chapter hopes to combine them into one large clinic, located in the Birmingham area and serving all of Oakland County.
