**Rezoning to Commercial Evokes Reader Objection**

To the Editor: I am writing this letter to oppose the rezoning of property on Woodward between Manor and Big Beaver roads from office to commercial. My reasons are as follows:

1. In July, 1962, the new zoning ordinance for Bloomfield Township was published in The Birmingham Eccentric. This plan was made carefully by the township board and was several years in the making. In this plan the lot on Woodward in question was zoned for office use, not commercial use. After only four months, why propose a change. Is there no permanence to these plans?

2. THE Rouge Manor Improvement Association, Inc., has met with Mr. Danto, the owner of this property, and his counsel, and have seen his proposed plans. We all realize that Mr. Danto, a Bloomfield Township resident, would erect an attractive structure, and maintain it in excellent condition, but we do not want:

- 1. A cocktail lounge, plus
- 2. A restaurant to seat 225 persons, plus
- 3. An 84-unit motel, two-and-a-half-story with swimming pool.

**Berkley and Fernald** also spoke out against the Detroit proposal at their meetings this week. Berkley Mayor George Kuhn has suggested a referendum on the issue. Although they took no action, Fernald commissioners protested bitterly against fluoridation.

Even though the resolution passed by the Detroit council by a sound, 7-1 margin, the controversy is far from over.

Detroit officials are sure that the order will be challenged in the courts. If and when all hurdles are cleared, the plan calls for the addition of fluorine to Detroit's water supply sometime in 1964.

Blurring, a chemical of the halogen family, which also includes iodine, bromine and chlorine, has been used for years as a water purifying agent. Fluorine acts as a tooth-decay preventative.

**IN BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP**, Supervisor Arno L. Hulet was authorized by the township board Monday night to negotiate with SOGWA for water. Completion of a water transmission main to service the township is anticipated by Jan. 1, 1964.

A member of the board, Henry M. Hogan, Jr., said he believes that fluoridation will not become an issue in the area.

Residents will save a great deal on water softeners once wells are eliminated. The iron content of the water and its hardness are real problems and I believe most residents will be delighted to use water from Detroit," Hogan said.

**IN BLOOMFIELD HILLS** all homes are presently getting their water from wells, but City Clerk Robert Stadler said the city engineer is preparing a report on the general condition of the city's water supply. He said he expected the report to be presented at the next commission meeting, Dec. 11.

West Bloomfield Township is presently supplied by both private and community wells. Under existing metropolitan plans, the southeastern corner of the township, however, could be brought into the Detroit system between now and 1970, according to Township Supervisor John C. Richard.

The supervisor said community systems in various new subdivisions are now being set up so that they can be hooked into a Detroit system in the future.

**IN LATHRUP**, city officials have not taken any stand on the fluoridation issue. City Administrator Gerald Stone said Wednesday morning that he had "no" indication that Lathrup will take any action at all.

Although Southfield Township is a member of the authority, portions of the three-village area are serviced by wells. Franklin and Bingham Farms presently get their water in this manner but Beverly Hills residents get their supply both from wells and from the authority, depending on their particular location.

As members of the authority, Franklin, Bingham Farms and the township proper may, of course, avail themselves of a supply from the authority in the future. Southfield Township proper, covering about 30 homes that are not located in the three incorporated areas, gets its water from wells.

THINK OF the crowds of people, the cars, the traffic! Birmingham residents have opposed cocktail lounges in their area. I believe many residents share our feelings.

Our desire is to keep this property for office use such as Gleaner and Burton Abstract which have a look of permanence and serve a different need.

On Monday, Dec. 3, at 8 p.m. there will be a public hearing regarding this proposal at the Township Hall, Telegraph Road, just south of Long Lake Road. Would all interested citizens please attend?

As for a stand on fluoridation, Council President Marvin Kline said, "The statistics that the medical profession has given indicate that fluoridation is a step forward. I would be in favor of it."

The City of Southfield is a member of the authority although many portions of the city still use wells.

City Clerk Patrick Flannery said that, as the city's water lines are extended, it is believed that the entire city eventually will be supplied with Detroit water.

As far as the fluoridation of the water from Detroit is concerned, Flannery said, "I have seen no indication from the council that feeling runs one way or the other on this issue."

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
