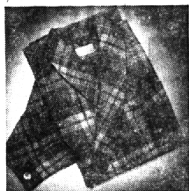


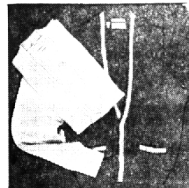

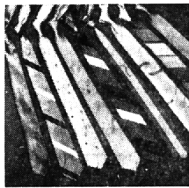

Candidate Lauds Voter Turnout

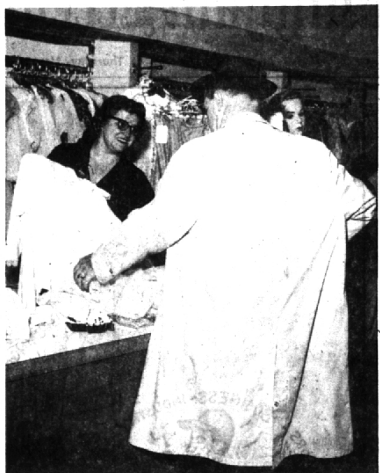
To the Editor:

Gowing Appointed Liaison Officer By AF Academy

WSU Professor From B'ham to Direct Project

Wayne State University's physics, chemistry and biology departments have been awarded \$20,200 in National Science Foundation grants.
A \$20,000 grant is awarded the chemistry department for a two-year study of the metabolism and enzymology of citramalic acid under the direction of Prof. Chauncey R. Benedict, 16219 Madeline, Birmingham. He is assisted by Prof. Robert Rinne, Harper Woods.
A \$45,000 grant has been awarded the physics department for a two-year study of the structure of liquids which are the least known in the world of gases, solids and liquids.

DIRECTOR OF THIS project is Prof. Leonard O. Roellig, assisted by Steve Wilson and Allen Becker.
The biology department is awarded a \$31,200 grant for a two-year study of the nature and role of certain blood proteins under the direction of Prof. Werner G. Heim. He is assisted by Mrs. Paula Lane and J. Michael Kerrigan.
