County to Ask \$8 Million in Federal Funds

The Oakland County Board of Supervisors has approved a proposal to seek \$8,000,000 in federal funds under the Acceleration Act of the Department of Public Works.

Among the projects the board is applying for federal funds for is a \$2 million auditorium on the MSU campus.

David Levinson, chairman of the

supervisor's ways and means committee, said the proposed auditorium would not cost the county anything.

A GROUP of citizens already has raised \$37,000 toward the local share of the cost.

Other projects included in the proposal are a Children's Village, a second wing on the courthouse

and further developments at the County Service Center on Telegraph.

The Children's Village would allow the county to expand and centralize its juvenile facilities. An amendment that would give the Children's Village priority over other projects at the Service Center was rejected.

Miss Sigl is a Visiting Nurse. Each year she becomes a temporary member of many families in the Detroit area.

In the weeks and months that followed, Miss Sigl and a physical therapist from the Association taught Mrs. M. how to help herself—how to wash, how to dress, how to turn around in bed, how to sit up, how to stand, how to walk.

Today Mrs. M. is able to walk with a cane. Her left arm and hand are very close to full recovery. She takes care of herself, her family, and her home without outside assistance.

Last year, the nurses, specialists, and home aides of the Visiting Nurse Association made more than 116,000 visits to the homes of the sick, the disabled, the needy.
