Special music for the afternoon session will be provided by Mrs. James Hunt, soloist.

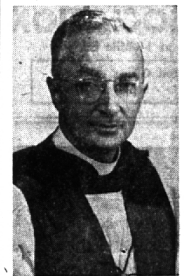

comes a "Junior Astronaut" and is so recognized. He then receives a certificate bearing the official signatures of the Seven Mercury Astronauts, as well as Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon and National Savings Bond Director William H. Neff.

Superintendent Jim Cherry, of Decatur, Ga., the Treasury's National Advisory Chairman on School Savings, hails the new program as a "step in the right direction." Supt. Cherry, who heads up the public schools in DeKalb County, is a strong believer in thrift education.

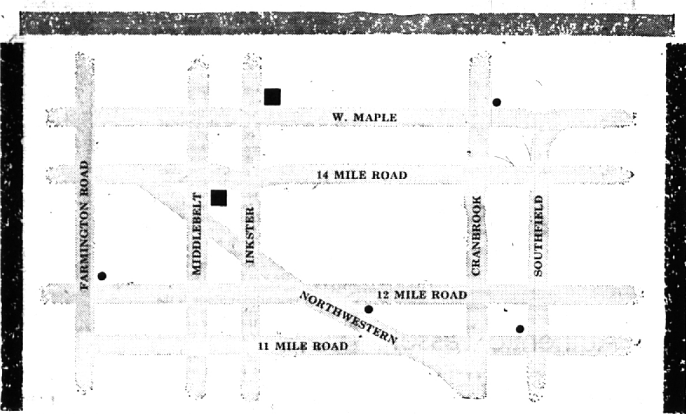
