Sigma Gamma Initiates 12 Local Girls

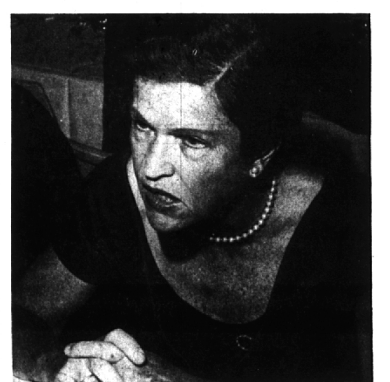
Sigma Gamma Association initiated 12 new members from Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills Friday at the Detroit Orthopedic Clinic.

Up-to-Date Schools To Be AAUW Topic

"Birmingham Schools Up-to-Date" is the topic to be discussed by Dr. Otis Dickey before the Birmingham branch of American Association of University Women at a 12:30 p.m. luncheon in the Birmingham Community House on October 10.

Dr. Dickey will discuss current requirements for hiring and advancement of Birmingham teachers, the building program in rapidly expanding school system and the controversial topic of Federal aid to education.

AAUW HAS enabled 30 area teachers to further their education through summer study in the

last five years. The group also contributes substantially to a national and international fellowship program through projects such as their recent book sale. Dr. Dickey has cited Birmingham AAUW for its "sustained interest in improving the educational opportunities of our children and youth."

Dr. Dickey is a trustee of MSUO Foundation and a director of the Metropolitan Detroit Bureau of School Studies.
