Ruth Shain Class To Open With Reply to UN Critics

The 43rd session of the Ruth Shain Class in International Relations begins at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 23, at Birmingham Community House, with a rebuttal to criticisms against the United Nations.

Members of the discussion group will be presented with a question and answer sheet in connection with the UN, its critics, and its 17th anniversary on Oct. 24.

Mrs. Shain said she would urge members of the class to visit UN headquarters.

"Until you see the beautiful UN building in New York City personally and observe first-hand its imposing program and accomplishments," said Mrs. Shain, "you simply cannot have the feeling for it that a visitor gains."

"I FEEL that the political character of the UN is overstressed," Mrs. Shain said. Its numerous humanitarian, educational and cultural agencies have influenced the course of recent history beyond expression."

Since its beginning, the Ruth Shain class has been sponsored by the Birmingham branch of the American Association of Univer-

sity Women. It is the longest continuous statement of international relations in the national organization of AAUW. However, participation in the class is also open to persons outside the AAUW.

Mrs. Shain is a longtime member of the Foreign Policy Association and the American Academy of Political Science.

SHE HAS made ten trips to Europe and traveled extensively through the Caribbean, the Grecian Islands and the Near East, as well as the American continent, in her studies of world problems.

The Ruth Shain class has an alumni list of more than 800 Birmingham women. It meets every other Tuesday, except in summer months.
