The ladies' hospitality committee is headed by Mrs. Mervyn G. Gaskin, wife of the president of the Automobile Club of Michigan. Another committee member is Mrs. Charles L. Wilson of Detroit, wife of the retiring AAA president, who will preside over convention sessions.

Special events for wives of delegates include a luncheon and fashion show at the Detroit Golf Club on Wednesday.

Delegates and wives will open the convention on Monday, Oct. 8, with a visit to Henry Ford Mu-

seum and Greenfield Village in Dearborn. Convention sessions will get underway Tuesday with an official welcome from Detroit Mayor Jerome Cavanaugh, followed by business sessions.

REP. WALTER B. Judd (R-Mich.) will be main speaker at a Tuesday noon luncheon. The Automobile Club of Michigan, which this month is celebrating centennial of its 600,000th member, will pay special tribute to Charles S. Mott, 81-year-old Flint industrialist, and Walter S. Austin, 96, Grand Rapids, only living members of the nine-man group that formed the national AAA in Chicago in 1902.

The convention will end officially with the annual banquet Wednesday evening in Detroit's Masonic Temple.

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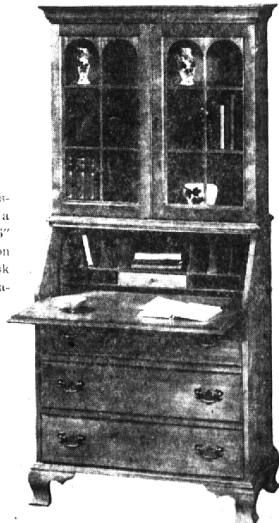
