## Cancer Volunteers Hold Conference At Michigan State

Michigan Cancer Foundation volunteers from Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties were joined this week by representatives from other cancer control agencies throughout the United States in a three-day leadership training conference being held on the campus of Michigan State University in East Lansing.

Opening Wednesday, the conference will continue with daily lectures and guest speakers until Friday noon. It is the ninth annual event of its kind sponsored by the Michigan Cancer Foundation in cooperation with Michigan State University faculty.

The program has been planned and coordinated this year by Dr. Russell Lowell Jenkins, Michigan State University Associate Professor, Communication Skills, and guest speaker for the closing luncheon, on Friday will be Dr. Charles E. Irvin, noted authority on management leadership from General Motors Corporation. Dr. Irvin's topic will be "Are You Big Enough to Keep?"

THE OUT-OF-TOWN delegates represent cancer control agencies formerly associated with the American Cancer Society which have lost their charters due to differences of opinion over fund-raising, and will be coming from Indiana, Ohio, Kansas, Louisiana, New York, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, Mississippi, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia and Washington.

The Michigan Cancer Foundation, Torch Drive agency which operates a voluntary cancer control program of research, education and service throughout Southeastern Michigan, had its charter revoked by the ACS in 1956 rather than relinquish its Torch Drive affiliation. In the past four years, the self-termed "independents" have met annually to pool resources and discuss program facilities for the continuance of their cancer control programs.

Lectures and study sessions on the qualities of good leadership will be in progress daily from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with evening sessions also planned. The conference will close Friday afternoon.

HOW MANY young people from good homes become unintentionally involved after seeing a movie which incites them to activities which they would ordinarily avoid?

I have heard the argument that the child will not be harmed if he has sound home training. But constant repetition on T.V. and in movies of certain low moral values will obviously eventually make its influence felt.

I AM anxious to see our high community standards maintained and improved and am deeply opposed to any addition which might present a problem for our youth.
