

Lakers Lash Milford 11 For 4th Win

West Bloomfield unleashed an awesome ground attack Friday night and rolled to its fourth consecutive win of the season. The Lakers, ranked 6th in State Class B competition last week, amassed a total of 388 yards rushing and rolled to an easy 27-0 victory over Milford.

DAN GREIG scored two touchdowns to lead the Lakers in their romp over hapless Milford. His first came on a 10-yard run and the second was chalked up on a seven-yard dash. Both were in the second quarter.

Two pass interceptions by the Lakers' defense threatened near the West Bloomfield goal line. The losers made it to the three at one point but gave up the ball on a fumble.

So far this year the Lakers have scored 15 touchdowns while limiting opponents to only two.

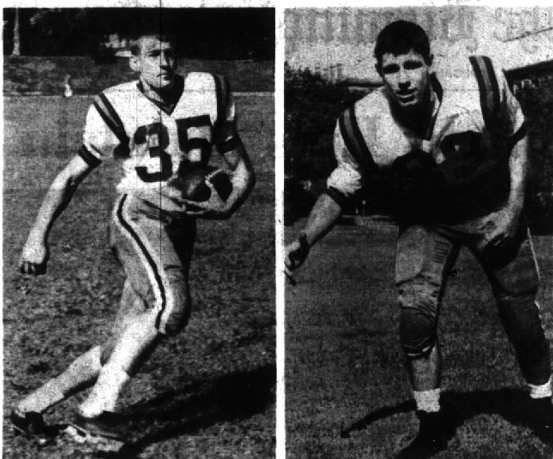

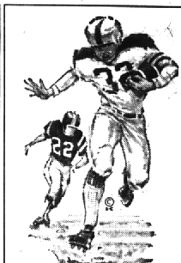
Pass Gamble Backfires on Southfield

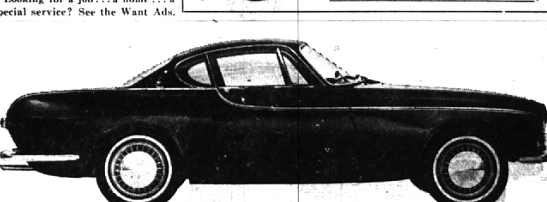

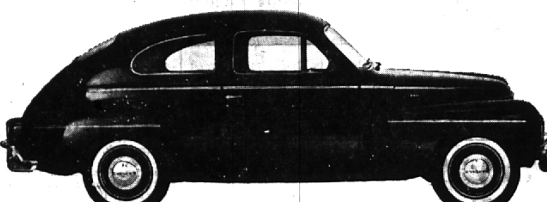
