Board of Education Cites Grading Policy

Highlights of the monthly Birmingham Board of Education meeting this week were a report by PTA Council President George Whitehead and a discussion of the system's secondary grading policy. In his presentation, Whitehead traced the history of the Birmingham PTA Council in which he noted the past achievements of the council. He also outlined current and future projects in which the

council is involved. The reporting of the council president to the board is an innovation this year. Whitehead said he feels that annual reports from the Parent-Teacher Association to the Board of Education are important.

IN SUMMARIZING the secondary school grading policy, Daniel Nabbit, deputy superintendent, pointed out that the quality of work achieved by the students is evaluated in terms of their achievement as measured against the goals or desired outcomes established for each course.

Department and citizenship is not used as a basis for measuring performance, he said. At no time is an earned performance grade reduced because of poor department. Citizenship and effort grades are determined separately and entered at the appropriate place on the report card.

Every high school graduate must attain a minimum quality point scholastic average of 1.50 (C-2; D-1) in work completed in grades 9-12. The 1.50 is determined at the end of the fifth marking period of the senior year. Honors and accelerated courses carry the following quality points: A-5; B-4; C-3.

HONOR ROLLS are computed on the basis of quality point average. Any student who has a quality point average of 3.0 to 4.0 is classified as having earned honors. Students who have an average of 4.0 or above are classified as having obtained high honors. The honor roll is computed by each report card period.

Citizenship and department are not entered in computing academic honor rolls. A "D" in any credit subject shall exclude the student from the honor roll.

Junior and senior high school students are rated for citizenship on a four-point scale as follows: 1—excellent; 2—good; 3—fair; 4—unacceptable. Citizenship is evaluated on the following: courtesy; respect for the rights and property of others; observance of the rules of the class and the school; service to the school; leadership and/or followership; academic industry (of senior high school rating only).

At the junior high level, an effort rating is also given. In addition to the citizenship rating. This is measured by the degree to which the following qualities are evident: Preparation for daily assignment; proper materials available in class; academic industry. The four-point rating is as follows: 1—excellent; 2—good; 3—fair; 4—unsatisfactory.

The 12 special education students in this district go to several different schools outside the district—one to the junior high in Southfield, one to Royal Oak and one to Farmington. Three go to Pontiac and six to Birmingham. Special station wagons or buses would have to be provided for the physically handicapped children.

A REPORT was also made on the building progress at Booth School and East Hills Junior High. Booth School should be completed within the next 10 days except for small items, and East Hills will near completion by Nov. 1.

A resolution regarding bids on the purchase of \$700,000 notes of Bloomfield School District No. Two was approved and a suggestion that an inspection and maintenance service for the schools' gas-fired equipment at an added fee was delayed until the next meeting.

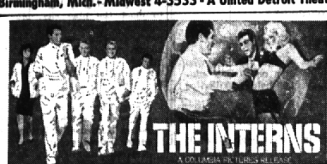
