THE CONVENTION, nearly two years in the planning, is expected to be the largest gathering of Catholic women in the history of the Church.

More than 10,000 delegates and visitors from the 50 states and the armed services overseas are expected to jam the huge Colma Hall Arena for the general events of the convention, with committees, group meetings and workshops spreading out through the sprawling building in the Civic Center.

Convention chairmen are depending on women from the Diocese of Archdiocese and the Diocese of Grand Rapids, Lansing, Marquette and Saginaw to select the attendees to record Detroit's.

FINAL ACCEPTANCE from some speaking celebrities are still awaited, but the planning committee already has listed a program of speakers, moderators and consultants of national status.

A full five days of action and interest-packed workshops and presentations have been planned to help delegates and visitors keep pace with the theme of the convention, "The Christian in a Changing World."

The timely role of Christian women will be discussed and illustrated in such areas as public

morality, children and youth, literature and the arts, lay participation and leadership in the Church, rural and urban life, spiritual development, intellectual life, communication, mental health, human relations, the underprivileged nations, and the national defense.
