

## Seaholm Tastes First Defeat, 27-7

A "Super" quarterback broke up the rugged Seaholm defense last Friday night and paced Ferndale to a 27-7 surprise victory over the Maples.

The loss knocked Seaholm from the undefeated ranks and almost eliminated their bid for the Eastern Michigan League crown.

The "Super" quarterback was sophomore Bob Super who ran the Ferndale club like a veteran signal-caller.

PACED BY SUPER and speedy half-back Jeff Hicks the Eagles

left little doubt from the opening kick-off that they were out to dump the Maples.

From that point the opening kick on their own 33 yard line and picked up five first downs carrying them to the Seaholm three.

On the next play Hicks sprang into a gaping hole in the Seaholm

forward wall, streaked into the secondary and was off on its second touchdown romp.

Set back deep in their own territory on a fine punt by Seaholm's Brant Conley and a penalty the Eagles found themselves on their own 15.

Once more the Ferndale front men opened holes in the Seaholm line and sprung Hicks and Chuck Rinehart loose for big gains.

THE EAGLES controlled the ball for 14 plays and carried it down to the Seaholm 20 before the

Maples held. The series of plays was a costly one for Seaholm as Ken Heft had to be carried from the field.

The next time Ferndale got their hands of the pigskin they moved from their own 28 to the Seaholm three as the half ended.

Tom Forsythe, Ferndale's starting fullback and co-captain, suffered a fractured arm after catching the pass from Super that put the ball on the three and was also taken to Beaumont.

SEAHOLM'S BOB Drutler fumbled on the first play from scrimmage

in the second half and Ferndale recovered on the Maple 28.

Three plays put the ball on the Seaholm one where Super called the old quarterback sneak and dived into the end zone. Stenback found the range again and booted the score to 20-0 with 9:30 to go in the third quarter.

Ferndale's final counter came on the opening play of the final 12 minutes of action as Dennis Wilson sprinted 26 yards for the touchdown. Stenback added his third extra point with 11:53 to go.

SEAHOLM'S LONE marker came at the half-way point in the final stanza as Conley banged over from one yard out. Seaholm's 48 yard march for the score was highlighted by a 20 yard Jim Foster to Jack Harvey aerial. Brent Miller kicked the extra point.

Seaholm almost added another tally late in the game but a Foster pass was intercepted and the Eagles ran out the clock.

The victory moved Ferndale in the number four spot in state class A ratings and tumbled the Maples out of the top ten. Tomorrow night Seaholm hopes to get back on the winning trail as they tangle with West Mt. Clemens.

It was the only defeat suffered by the home team in an otherwise successful season. Cranbrook's record this year stands at 2-2.

"The Cleveland School always has a good tough outfit," said Coach Pete Slater. "They went undefeated last year."

SLATER WAS quite unhappy about the Cranes' loss to Nichols School from New York last week, a tilt in which Cranbrook was edged 14-8.

"I don't feel that they were that much better than us," he said. "We controlled the ball during most of the game. They had two long runs that hurt us."

He wasn't exaggerating when he said long runs.

EARLY IN THE GAME, Nichol's Mike Quinlan found running room around his own left end and romped 15 yards for the visitors' first touchdown.

And it was only an inkling of what was to come. In the third quarter, Craig Butler raced in and out of Cranbrook defenses on an 80-yard jaunt for the New Yorkers' second score.

A pass from Quinlan to Butler accounted for a two-point conversion.

QUARTERBACK Dick Mosher put Cranbrook on the scoreboard in the third period as he sneaked one yard for the tally, culminating a 55-yard drive.

The two-pointer was added on a pass from Mosher to Dave Schultz.

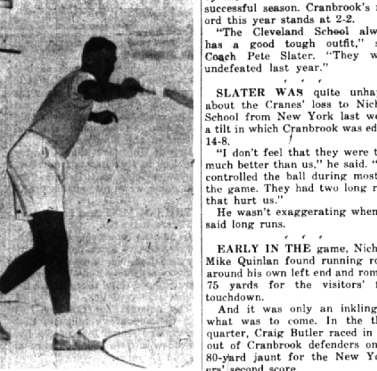
The Cranes ran 65 plays as compared to 20 for the visitors and picked up 16 first downs while Nichols was limited to 5.

TOTAL YARDAGE was about even, with Cranbrook gaining 236 and Nichols, 264. Mosher completed seven passes of 20 attempts and Quinlan threw one for four.

It marked the second week in a row in which the Cranes had been beaten by a touchdown or less. The week before the Nichols contest, Slater's crew was nipped by Waterford Kettering 22-21.
