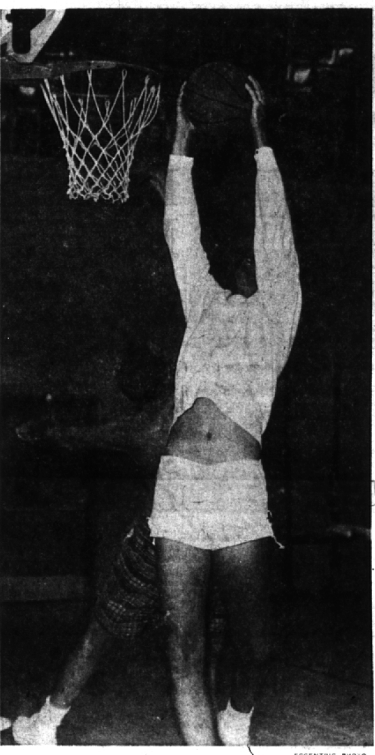

Archbishop Speaks at Local Church

The Most Rev. Geoffrey Francis Fisher, former Archbishop of Canterbury, started off his week-long stay in southeast Michigan by speaking at an 8 a.m. communion service at St. James Episcopal Church in Birmingham.

The former prelate of 42 million Anglicans, who was named Lord Fisher of Lambeth upon his retirement in 1961, was the guest of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan.

The Rev. Kenneth H. Gass, rector of St. James, has acted as chaplain for the Archbishop and his wife during their stay. He accompanied them to all church services and civic functions which they attended.

At St. James, the former Archbishop's sermon was based on the importance of the local parish in relation to the total work of the church.

DR. GASS said Lord Fisher was apparently very moved by the opening anthem at the service. It was "I Was Glad," which was sung at the coronation of Queen Elizabeth in Westminster Abbey at which the former Archbishop officiated.

At St. James as well as at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Detroit later in the day, congregations wishing to hear Lord Fisher spilled into all available chapels, galleries, halls and out onto church steps.

Lord and Lady Fisher toured the Ford Rouge plant Tuesday and visited Assumption College, Windsor, Ontario, Canada, where he received an honorary degree.

At both sessions, the lecture will be followed by participation in small discussion groups, which will formulate questions to ask the lecturer.
