tions between the ladies of the press and the women behind the Republican candidates.

Their star, of course, was Mrs. Romney who had a message for each audience. Around a central theme—"It's time to clean house after 14 years—she painted a picture that expressed concern for the working man, the Negro, ethnic groups."

Yet she deplored the emphasis on "groups," with a "let's not pit people against each other."

SHE STRESSED the need for "more efficiency in government" and grinned as her little granddaughter wooed votes with her efforts to stand on her head.

She expressed her belief that "women are interested in more than recipes and clothes."

Among other things, the candidate's wife met with a little campaigning in reverse. She collected a minor mountain of printed plugs for other office seekers.

Greeted by a Negro woman who boosted her son's candidacy for a post in the state senate with "if you can't vote for him, pray for him," Mrs. Romney replied, "I will do that."

IN HAMTRAMCK, she delighted her listeners with the story of a campaign introduction once accorded her by a fumble-tongued chairman.

"He said, 'I'd like you to meet the governor's new wife. Parlor, I mean the new governor's old wife,'" she related with a chuckle.

Since June 5, Mrs. George Romney has devoted four days a week to a smorgasbord of campaign appearances such as this. Somehow she manages to look relaxed and refreshed despite the rigors of a schedule that has included speaking in every one of Michigan's 83 counties.

"I get steamed up," she admits, "because I believe this campaign is so important."

That, she says, is why she works so hard to swing the vote that may "let George do it."

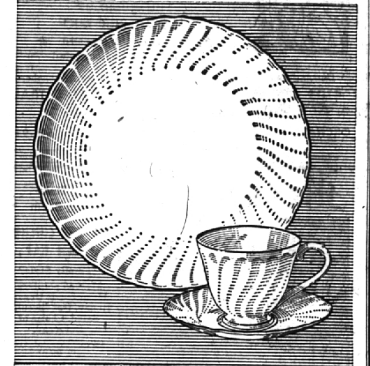
