Rev. Lindsay Is Director Of Lutherans

The Rev. Kenneth M. Lindsay, new Director of activities for the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in the Detroit-Metropolitan area, officially assumed his new position in a special service of installation at Epiphany Lutheran Church Sunday.

As EXECUTIVE Director of the Lutheran Church Association of Greater Detroit, Pastor Lindsay will concern himself with the areas of publicity, public relations, radio and television, community and social services, and will also direct the "Detroit Lutherans." Present Lutheran Center offices are located at 2932 Gratiot Ave. Also under the operation of the Lutheran Center is the church's Book Store, located at 2944 Gratiot.

The Rev. Mr. Lindsay comes to his new position from an associate pastorate at Bethany Church on Detroit's east side, where he has served for the past 12 years. Previous pastorates were at Moses Lake, and Seattle, Wash.

ACTIVITIES on behalf of the larger church have included work for the Lutheran Laymen's League and the Lutheran Women's Missionary League. The Rev. Mr. Lindsay has also been serving as counselor for nineteen east side congregations and as chairman of the Lutheran Center Governing Board.

As Executive Director of all activities for Missouri Synod congregations, Pastor Lindsay will represent some 120 churches in the area, and over 75,000 people.

Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Sets Drive for New Church

Official announcement came today from the pastor's office, Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church, Birmingham, that a drive is being launched immediately to finance the construction of the parish's new permanent church.

In reviewing the building project, the Rev. Lucian A. Hebert, said: "Every member of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Parish must certainly agree—familiar as each is with the obstacles under which we operate—that we need our new permanent church, and we need it now. This is the climax, the most vital and dramatic part of our growth as a parish. To begin and complete our new church is a challenge to every parishioner, as well as to those of us who serve the parish.

"THE PRESENT church structure is temporary in its use," Fr. Hebert continued. "Built in 1952, its real purpose is that of gymnasium and activities center for the parish. With nearly 1,000 children in our school, we need a gym badly. The present building is also intended to serve as a parish social center. As a church, it is presently overcrowded—particularly at late Masses.

"So the need for a new church is here. How to accelerate its financing without placing undue strain on parishioners is the question.

"Our church, as do most churches, has a building committee on which parish lay members serve," Fr. Hebert added. "One of their guiding principles is this: Among the members and their guests, Mrs. Arthur Heinz and many of her articles will be offered for sale.

MRS. E. Y. TOMLINSON will display for sale many things made by refugees in Hong Kong. All of the money made will be sent back to The Lutheran Deaconess in Hong Kong to further mission work.

The sale will start at 1 p.m. with dessert and coffee being served to the members and their guests. Mrs. Walter Ahrens is chairman assisted by Mrs. John Allmon, Mrs. Robert Ebert, Mrs. H. Hyvonen, and Mrs. Louis Vardon.
