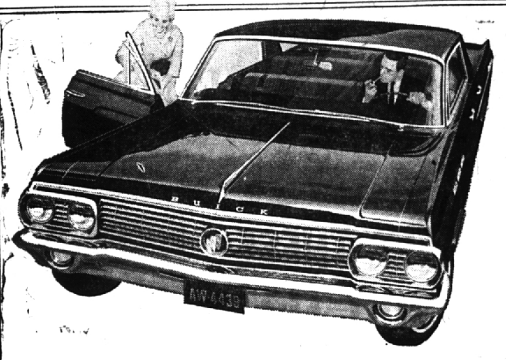

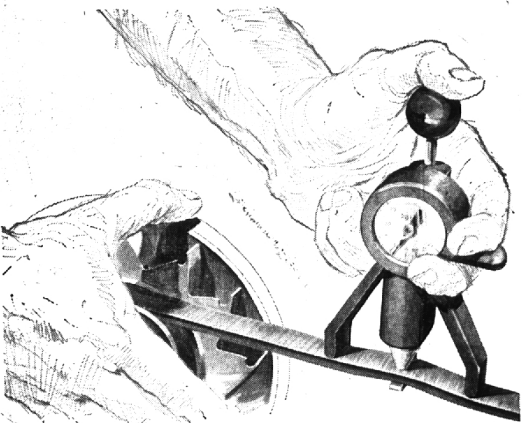

An estimated saving of \$90,000 to \$100,000 a year will accrue to Bloomfield Township from the action of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors Wednesday afternoon in deciding definitely to return the administration of poor relief back to individual townships and cities after Jan. 1.

The question of football supremacy between Baldwin High School and Cranbrook School will be settled once and for all in Cranbrook stadium Friday afternoon, when these two natural rivals, each having defeated the other once in the past two years, meet for the last time. Officials of the Bloomfield Hills school have announced the contest will mark the end of all athletic relationships with public high schools, inasmuch as state high school eligibility rules make it impossible for prep school opponents to use their full strength, and therefore make for unnatural difficulties in training for the games.

Birmingham Board of Education Tuesday night gave Superintendent of Schools Dwight B. Ireland the "go ahead" signal on the proposed addition of eight classrooms to Pierce Elementary School. This, \$150,000 addition will serve to relieve the present overcrowding at Pierce and prepare for the influx of elementary school children that are either growing up or moving into the area which Pierce serves.

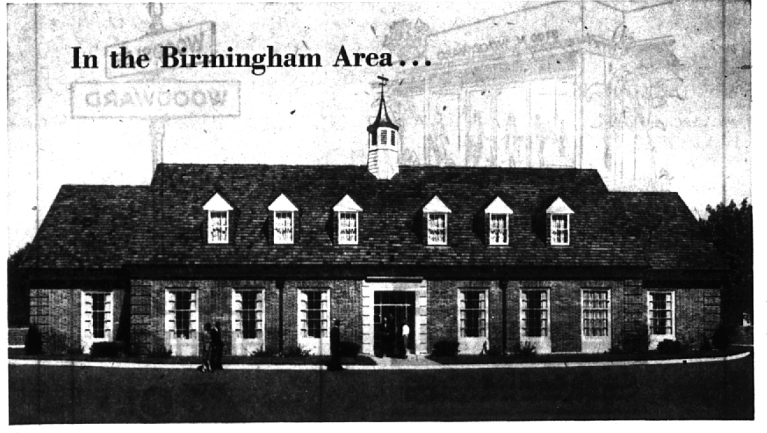

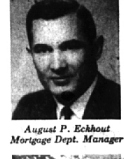
