"Northville will be a tough team to beat."

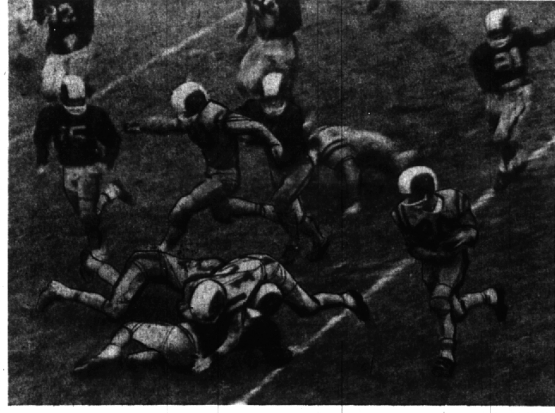
IT WAS NOT until the final quarter that Paddy's crew was able to tame the fiery Mustangs, 27-12, and extend the Lakers' win string to six in a row.

THE MUSTANGS tied the game in the second quarter when Jim Higgins ran three yards to cap a drive that started with a fumble by West Bloomfield's Mike Joe Hay booted the extra point.

THE PASSING combination of Craig Bell to Don Biery narrowed the gap to 14-13.

THEN CAME THE biggest scare for the Lakers. Greig dropped the ball in the backfield and Mustang linebacker Joe Hay scooped it up and raced 45 yards to score the go-ahead touchdown for Northville late in the third quarter.

Cranes Edged, 7-0; Soccer Team Wins

Cranbrook's football and soccer teams played under leaky skies Saturday before a gallery of homecoming fans and settled for a split with Cleveland University School contingents.

THE CRANES held the visitors scoreless until the fourth stanza when quarterback Fred Merrick capped a 50-yard drive by scoring from four yards out.

Cranbrook knocked on the door twice when they drove to Cleveland's 15 and eight yard lines, only to give up the ball on downs.

OF CONCERN to Slater was the fact that quarterback Dick Mosher suffered a "charleyhorse" during the game and may not be able to play Saturday when the Cranes journey to Pittsburgh, Pa. to take on Shady Side Academy.

"IT WILL BE A very tight game," Slater said. "If Mosher is able to play, we will have a good chance of winning."

Cleveland outgained the Cranbrook squad in total yardage, 178 to 130. The Cranes attempted six passes and completed two while Cleveland tried two and completed none.

Miller booted the extra point to put the home team in front, 13-0.

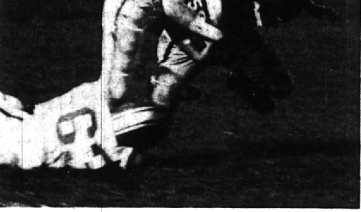
A SPECTACULAR 80-yard run by Rick Carlson with an intercepted pass put the Maples in front 19-12 with less than three minutes left in the game.
