

# Animal Lovers Rally for Fair In Auditorium at Cranbrook

An annual event of interest to antique collectors as well as animal lovers is the Antique Fair sponsored by the Michigan Animal Rescue League which will be held at Cranbrook Auditorium 550 Lone Pine Road, Bloomfield Hills, Sept. 13, 14 and 15, from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Each year the Society has taken pride in adding a new line of antiques, all offered for sale. This, the tenth consecutive show, will feature an unusual exhibit of firearms, many dating back to Civil War and Revolutionary days; fine antique jewelry, and buttons by one of the largest collectors in the state.

Primitives, furniture, china, glassware, copper, old books and many other items collected by several outstanding Michigan dealers will also be on display.

The public will find themselves in a cafe where sandwiches, baked goods and other refreshments will be served.

Antique lovers who also love animals may wish to visit the shelter which the Society has maintained for the past five years at 750 Featherstone Road in Pontiac, and enjoy seeing the unusually large selection of puppies and kittens now being offered for adoption.

From this, the only humane shelter in existence in Oakland County, countless numbers of unwanted and mistreated animals have been aided and over 2,000 placed in new homes.

The proceeds from last year's fair made possible the construction of new aluminum-fenced outdoor runs. This year, most of the money raised will be used for the maintenance and upkeep of the shelter.

# Three Candidates Report \$12,000 Campaign Costs

Three Republican candidates in Oakland County's fall primary listed almost \$12,000 as spent in their campaigns, according to election expense vouchers that were filed with the county clerk's office.

Two of them, Farrell E. Roberts and Troy Mayor Robert J. Huber, ran against each other for the GOP nomination for the state senate.

The other candidate was incumbent Drain Commissioner Daniel W. Barry.

Huber had \$3,011 in contributions and spent \$1,000 of his own money; he polled 6,647 votes, losing to Roberts.

Roberts supporters spent \$2,973, with \$1,228 coming out of the candidates' own pockets. He stacked up 17,000 votes.

Richard D. Kuhn, the third man in the state senate race, spent \$509 with \$371 in contributions. Of this, \$100 came from his brother and Berkeley Mayor George W. Kuhn. Loser to Roberts, he had 3,000 votes.

George E. Lennox, running in the congressional primary, and John C. Hitchcock, who lost a race as representative of the sixth district.

Fulkerson's supporters spent \$1,756. Some \$1,200 of that amount still remained to be paid at the time of filing.

Lennox spent \$1,208 with \$325 outstanding. Hitchcock reported \$1,406 as against his opponent, Madison Heights Mayor Bill S. Huffman's \$413.

Seven candidates spent no money to campaign. They were Henry Hogan Jr., Daniel T. Murphy, Ralph A. Main, Charles A. Sparks, Arthur J. Law, George F. Taylor, and William A. Smith.

Barry spent \$2,957 to win over Arthur Becker in the Republican race for drain commissioner. Becker spent \$241.

Barry contributors were Charles Rogers, S. A. Healy and E. Gargaro, \$1,000. They represented three contracting firms, bearing their names, which worked on the 12-Town Storm Drain.

Others contributing to Barry's campaign were Mancini Construction Co., Warren, \$500; Ed Levy, \$200, and Miller Thompson Construction Co., Inc., 24130 Telegraph, Southfield, \$300.

ANOTHER \$12,000 was reported as spent in the campaigns for 37 other candidates. Three candidates who have not yet filed returns are Republican Terrance E. Nagle of Beverly Hills and two Democrats, Stanley F. Dunn of Birmingham and Lee Walker of Madison Heights.

Leading the Democrats in spending, according to the figures filed, were George J. Fulkerson and
