

Course Offered By Civil Defense At Lathrup School

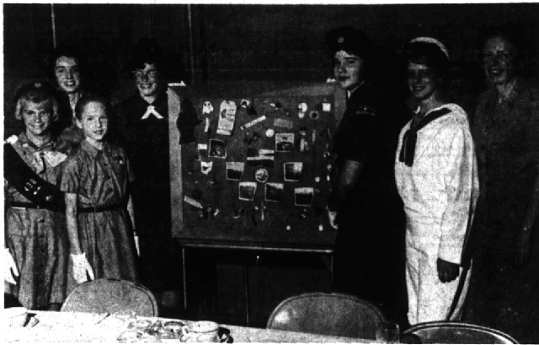
LATHRUP—The city in cooperation with the Oakland County office of Civil Defense and the county health department, began a medical emergency course in survival and disaster training Monday evening.

Classes will be held from 8 to 10 p.m. each Monday for 13 weeks at the Lathrup School on Southfield courses.

Road and will include instruction and practice in subjects including casualty care, first aid, psychological first aid, decontamination and others.

A field exercise will be part of the course. This will demonstrate the conversion of a school to an emergency hospital. The course is open to the public.

Commissioner Commends Keep City Clean Project

Roberts told his fellow commissioners at Monday night's meeting that there has been "a fine spirit of cooperation" between the city administration and the merchants.

THIS SATURDAY, he said, members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce will distribute to all business establishments cards printed by the Chamber of Commerce setting up rules for keeping the city clean.

The following week, a City

brochure explaining regulations pertaining to refuse collections will be distributed. It is entitled "Don't Be a Litterbug."

Absentee Voters' Counting Boards Draw Approval

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night accepted City Clerk Irene Hanley's recommendation to set up absentee voters' counting boards for the Nov. 6 general election.

A board for counting absentee ballots was used for the first time in the Aug. 7 primary election.

Miss Hanley reported that the Oakland County Canvassing Board reviewed all of those ballots as part of an official recount requested by a defeated candidate—and found no errors.

"IT IS recommended," she said, "that absent voters' counting boards be approved again."

Commissioners gave her authority to establish as many as three boards for the November election. The actual number of boards needed will be determined by Oct. 16, Miss Hanley said.

Commissioners unanimously approved her recommendation.
