SOUTHFIELD—A former Southfield councilman died Sunday from what police believe was a self-inflicted bullet wound. Robert F. Wuerfel, 69, of 26120 Circle Drive, was found in the bathroom of his home. He was pronounced dead shortly before 4:30 p.m. by an Oakland County coroner.

His wife, Nellie, told police her husband had been in poor health and had recently been in hospital. Mrs. Wuerfel and several friends were elsewhere in the house when the shot was fired.

WUERFEL was a member of the first council in the City of Southfield, following the city's incorporation in 1968. He resigned the following year because of poor health.

He was chairman of the zoning board of appeals in Southfield Township before his election to the city council.

Injunction Threatened Over Storm Drainage

BEVERLY HILLS—The City of Southfield's storm drainage entered into two discussions at village council meeting last week.

First, John LeRoy, secretary of the board of trustees of the Beverly Hills Methodist Church, and the Rev. Robert Boley, minister of the church, petitioned the council to do something about a property at 13 Mile Road and Evergreen on which they would like to build a new church.

The church group owns the adjacent property, but would trace properties with Coleman Developers, who own the corner property. Coleman has been threatened by Robinson Brothers with an injunction if a subdivision is built on either property which would empty into the Evans Drain.

IN AN ASSOCIATED motion, Councilman Claude A. Shephard moved that the council authorize the Rev. Robert Boley, minister of the church, petitioned the council to do something about a property at 13 Mile Road and Evergreen on which they would like to build a new church.

The proposed injunction would stop the developers, who are now installing storm sewers on the southeast corner of 13 Mile Road and Southfield in the City of Southfield, from connecting the storm sewer to the Evans Drain.

THE BEVERLY Hills council has considered the City of Southfield and requesting a meeting on their common drainage problems. Southfield has not replied as yet.

In an effort to assist the church group, the council finally made a motion to have Johnson and Anderson, village engineers, make a preliminary study and estimate of costs on storm drainage from the Lake Orion.

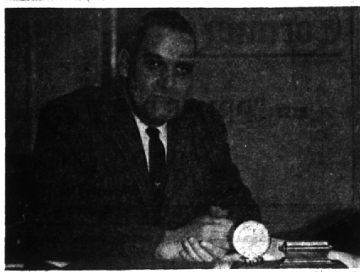
Village Bookworms To Get Certificates

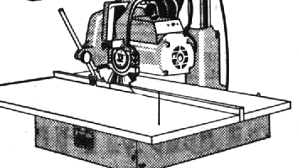

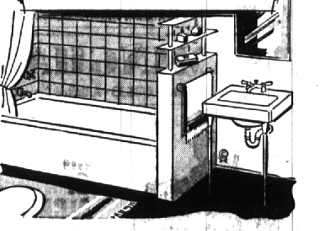
