

Approve Eton Relief Sewers

Necessity for relief sewers in the S. Eton area was declared by Birmingham city commissioners Monday night.

They authorized the engineering department to prepare construction drawings and cost estimates for sewers in the area east of Terry road including both sides of Eton.

At Monday's public hearing, City Engineer William T. Killen pointed out that a postal card survey of residents in the area (the Sheffield subdivisions) showed 45 of the homes having experienced some degree of basement flooding.

COST OF THE project will be assessed on a basis of 85 per cent.

THE ETON relief sewers project

is one of several the City plans to have ready for construction upon completion of the entire Twelve Towns system.

Hearings on confirmation of the Township Approves Two Plats; Okays Sewer Extension

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP — Two plats were approved by the township board at its meeting Monday night.

A plat involving development of 25 acres at the southwest corner of Opdyke and Square Lake roads got board approval. The land will have 25 homesites. A 300 by 1100 foot section has been reserved for multiple dwellings.

A plat for Hickory Grove Hills subdivision received approval. Located at Opdyke and Hickory Grove roads, the subdivision has 94 homesites.

The board also awarded a contract for construction of a Devon Gables sewer extension on Long Lake, west of Telegraph.

Developer Asks For Refund on New Water Line

Property owners along 13 Mile, between Greenfield and Southfield roads, as well as others south of that point for about a mile, may have to pay for a new water line sometime in the future.

Southfield City officials say they may have to depart from the normal special assessment financing for water improvements. A developer, Jacob Rose, has asked for refund from other property owners.

Rose is building a 12-inch line at his own expense, west along 13 Mile to service a subdivision he is erecting at Southfield Road.

The developer wants other benefiting property owners to share part of the cost when they tap into the line.

THE WATER LINE is considered part of the city's master service plan. Residents are now served by a four-inch line under 13 Mile Road which was installed when Southfield was still a township.

The smaller line is owned by Beverly Hills on the north side but services both sides of the street.

Six and eight-inch laterals, running south from 13 Mile, receive their water from this smaller line. Officials say the resulting bottleneck reduces pressure during the summer.

Officials also question whether there is an adequate water supply for fire fighting.

Following a full report by City Administrator Donald V. Smith, the council will decide whether to have residents tie into the larger line and pay the assessments.

Injured in Crash

LATHRUP — City Treasurer Bernice Gruse was injured Monday afternoon in a traffic accident on Southfield Road, in front of the Lathrup Post Office.

Mrs. Bernice A. Gruse is in satisfactory condition at William Beaumont Hospital. She suffered cuts on the face and mouth.

The accident occurred when the car driven by Mrs. Gruse and another vehicle driven by Mrs. Belle Schram, 47, of Oak Park collided head-on. Mrs. Schram suffered minor injuries.

Village May Buy Property from S'field Township

BEVERLY HILLS.—The council moved last week to ask Southfield Township to delay any action on the sale of the property on Fiere, from Kinross to Loehrich.

The township was authorized by voters in the August primary to sell the lots. The village would like to investigate the possibility of buying the lots for recreation facilities.

In other business, Councilman Claude Shepherd, chairman of the committee on roads, will request a meeting with presidents of civic associations to see what can be done about resodding ditches which have been newly cut.

An investigation is underway to see if an amendment should be made to the sidewalk ordinance providing for subdivisions to build sidewalks along main roads.

Two public hearings will be held Oct. 1. One is on a proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance which will allow for a new zoning classification, R2-A.

R-2 zoning calls for a 1200-square-foot house on one floor, with a 75-foot front lot. R-2 allows the same size house but lot size may be as low as 60 feet. Both classifications permit houses 1 1/2 or 2 stories in height, for a total of 1000 square feet each.

The second hearing will be to hear objections to rezoning the William A. Gilmore property on 13 Mile Road, west of Southfield, from R-2 to R-2-A.

Computer To Tell Tourist Industry About Travelers

LANSING—An electronic report on Michigan travelers is being developed by the Michigan State Highway Department.

The report will show tourist industry leaders where Michigan travelers come from, where they go, how long they stay, what type of recreation they seek and what kind of accommodations they prefer.

"Michigan will be the first state in the nation to record its tourist traffic on an electronic computer regularly throughout the tourist season," said John Murray, director of the Highway Department's Motorist Services Division.

A SEPARATE card is made for each traveler served at one of the Highway Department's tourist information centers. Each card is sent to Lansing, where it is coded and fed to the computer.

The Highway Department operates three permanent tourist centers—at New Buffalo, Monticomee and Mackinac City—and plans to open one each in Monroe and Gogebic counties next year.
