Accredited judges will be assisted by student judges in rating the arrangements according to the merit system.

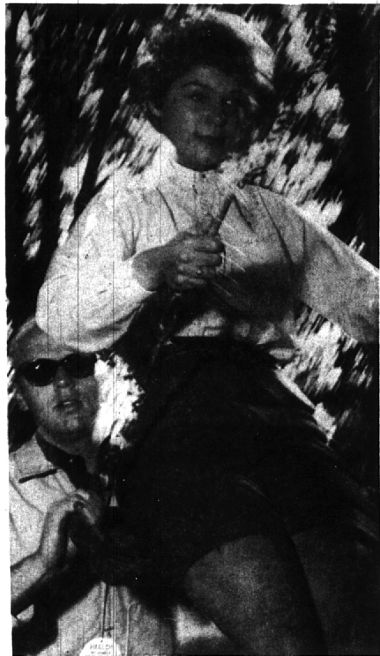

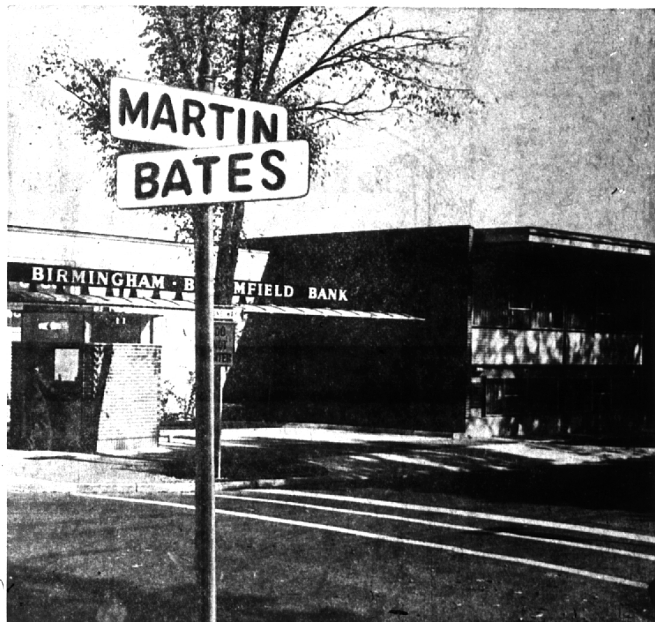
