Field Teacher Aids in Research

William R. O'Brien, social studies teacher at Southfield High School, is one of an eight-member research team which is blazing new trails in education for Oakland County children this fall.

O'Brien has been nominated by the Southfield Public Schools to devote full time to helping to research and revise social studies curricula for the fall semester. He and other committee members are working with Dr. Myles Platt, county director of social studies, to develop content and sequence in teaching social studies.

O'BRIEN AND his colleagues will agree on 50 to 100 concepts within the area of the social studies that children should learn at every grade level. They will create instruction materials and, by mid-October, will have the first of these in the hands of the Southfield teachers to test in their classes.

The research team will call on scholars in the fields of history, geography, economics, sociology, political science and anthropology.

The legal and moral responsibilities of real estate brokers and salesmen to the public will be stressed, and the legal pitfalls that can and often do present themselves in real estate transactions will be discussed.

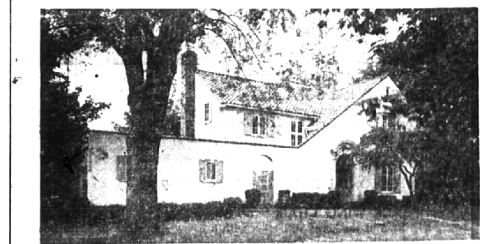

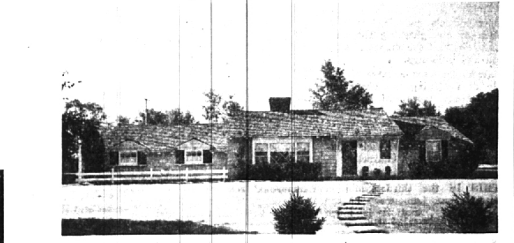
