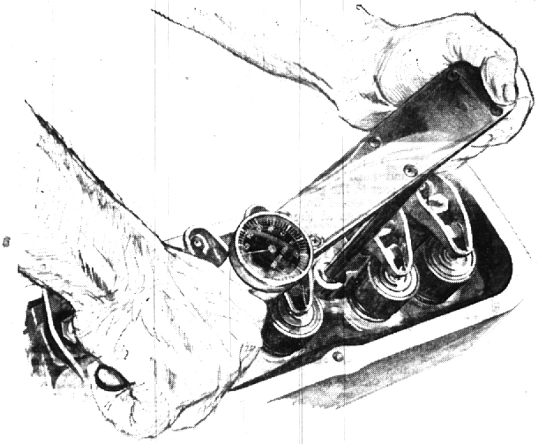

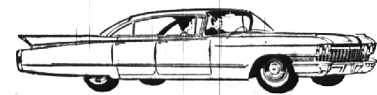

Ski Patrol To Conduct Classes Here

Michigan's Ski Patrols, whose members give first aid assistance to injured skiers, are in need of recruits to care for the growing number of skiers and ski areas throughout the state.

"Ski patrolmen and patrolwomen actually prevent a great number of accidents each year through such safety tips to beginners as the care of bindings and the proper way to get on and off chair lifts and rope tows," said Donald C. Williams, chief of Michigan's lower section of the National Ski Patrol System. "But we need new members," he added.

Williams said he hopes for a good turnout at Standard and Advanced Red Cross First Aid courses that will rest underway in Birmingham Sept. 20 at the Community House.

THIS YEAR the two courses have been combined to provide 13 weeks of uninterrupted training with the emphasis on first aid for skiers. A Ski Patrol candidate must complete both courses successfully to be eligible for ski proficiency training and tests which begin when the snow flies. Classes meet one night a week and last from 7:30 to 10:30 p.m.

Advanced registrations for the first aid courses are being accepted now at the Community and Williams urged prospective ski patrol candidates to register as soon as possible so instructors can estimate the size of the classes they will teach.

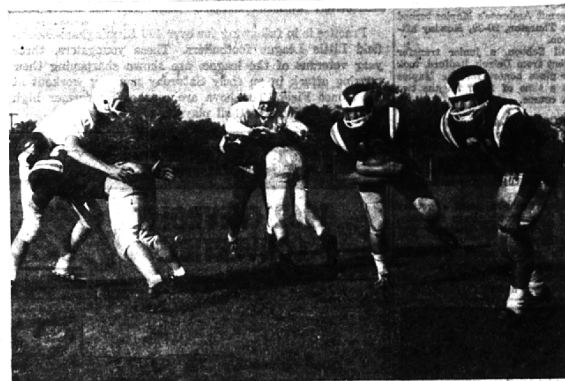
