Sea-Going Adventure Nearly Swamps Youths

A sea-going adventure that the most gullible land lubber would find hard to believe was experienced recently by two young men of Birmingham, Jim Kemp and Pete Fisher, and two of Pete's houseguests from Washington, D.C. Houseguests Tom Wilson and Bob Judd, Ties Georgetown University classmates had never been sailing.

The four went to Mackinac to bring home Mrs. Susan Fisher's sloop "Old Rarity". Since the 33-foot pilot boat participated in the Mackinac races this summer, Mrs. Fisher had kept it at her summer home on Bois Blanc Island, across the Straits of Mackinac.

The boys left Cheboygan about 8 p.m. Sunday. About dusk they sailed into a field of unit buoys left by a construction crew. Finding their way through was like threading a needle.

THE BOYS had their course charted perfectly, but about two or three a.m. discovered a gas tank was in the magnetic field of the compass. By the time they moved the tank, they were too fatigued in the channel.

They tried to get back using motor and sails, but a heavy fog set in, with waves five to ten feet high. They took down the jib. It went overboard, under the boat and behind, looking like a huge monster following them.

They tried to reef the mainsail, but waves were coming over the boat and it pitched like a cork. Then the tiller broke, the boat turned to windward and the sail tore to shreds. They motored for 45 minutes and ran out of gas.

THEY HAD more gas, but the key and funnel had already washed overboard and by now they were outside the freighter channel. They lashed the tiller to try to keep going straight, left the mainsail up for stability and went below. There they tried to reef the mainsail, but waves were coming over the boat and it pitched like a cork. Then the tiller broke, the boat turned to windward and the sail tore to shreds. They motored for 45 minutes and ran out of gas.
