From the moment, six weeks ago, when our cat, Taffy, had her four tabby kittens the children pleaded to keep all the babies—Cleo, Figero, Elsie and Alice.

A new pre-school theatre combines folk singing with creative dramatization to teach the three to six-

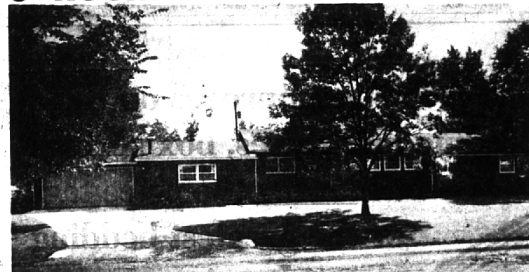
year olds words, "Isn't it wonderful to finally see it in living color!"

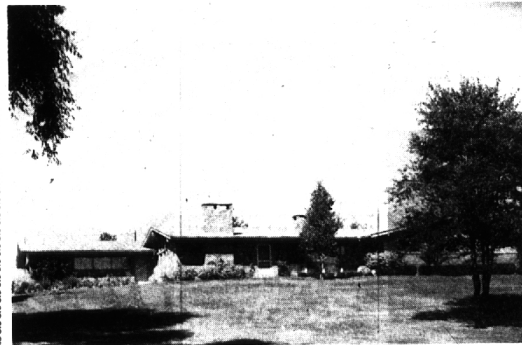
