Arts and Crafts Offers New Degree

A four-year course planned to lead to a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Industrial Design will be offered by the art school of the Society of Arts and Crafts in Detroit for the first time this fall.

The announcement was made by Walter B. Ford II, president of the society's board of trustees, who said that a request to initiate the school's first degree course is now pending with the Michigan Department of Public Instruction.

High School Students Take Math at MSUO

Twenty-five gifted high school students have a chance to take a college math course for credit at Michigan State University Oakland this fall. Those selected receive scholarships paying half of their tuition.

This is the second MSUO course being made available to outstanding high school students who are recommended by their principals.

Those selected from this area are — from Groves High School—Peter Toot, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. David F. Toot, 1710 Blair House Court, Bloomfield Hills, and Robert E. Winkel Jr., 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Winkel, 25701 Franklin Hills Drive, Franklin.

REPRESENTING Bloomfield Hills High School are Fred Fink, 17, son of Dr. and Mrs. L. Jerome Fink, 4430 Quorton Road, Bloomfield Hills, and Thomas Hoopen-gardner, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Adriaan D. Hoopen-gardner, 1414 Lenox, Birmingham.

Seaholm High School is not participating in the program.

These courses not only give unusually able high school seniors a forerunner of college, but also a full, official first step toward the B.A. degree. Each of the courses will carry four hours' credit which will be good at MSUO, or transferable to any other institution.

THE COURSE is given Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Because of the importance attached to this special class it is being taught by the head of the Mathematics Department, Dr. James H. McKay, who is also Associate Dean for sciences and mathematics.

Probability and Statistics is not generally available in this area to advanced placement high school students as are other freshmen courses like calculus and analytical geometry.

Offering it in the evening solves a transportation and scheduling difficulty that has hindered previous arrangements to make some of MSUO's courses available to outstanding high school seniors during the day.

ANOTHER course open to high school seniors is the nationally renowned College of the Air economics class. Those enrolled will watch the television program from 6:30 to 7:00 a.m. four mornings a week and attend class on the MSUO campus from 8:30 to 9:30 Monday evenings. They do outside papers and take examinations. It is open both to MSUO students and to high school seniors recommended by their schools.

Will-O-Way Begins Modeling Classes

Process Data For Schools

Schools in Oakland County now have a complete electronic data processing center available for their use, according to an announcement this week from the Oakland County Board of Education.

An electronic computer was added to sorting, printing and calculating equipment already in use at the county offices.

Rex Wood, Director of Administration for the Oakland County Board of Education, said the data processing center can now handle payrolls, scheduling for high schools and other record processing and research operations.

LAST YEAR tests for 70,000 Oakland County school children were machine scored at the county offices, Wood said. Each of the 29 local school districts in the county now uses the center to score standardized tests.

More economical office procedures in local school offices will be possible, Wood added, as increased use is made of the data processing equipment.

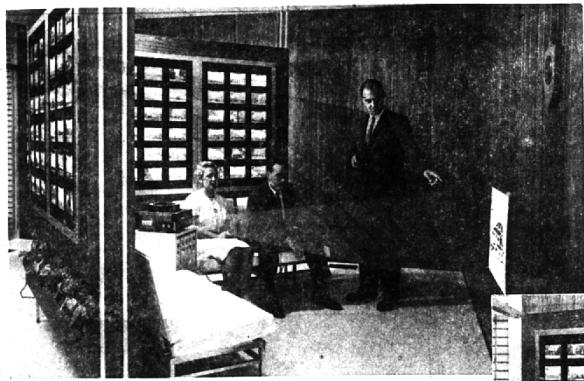
SATURDAYS: September 22, and 29, October 6, 1962 from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon.

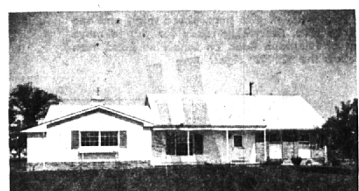

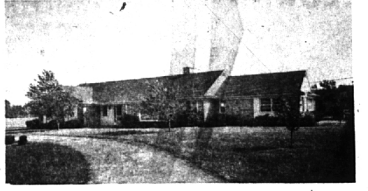
