

## Church Plans Scholarships For Campers

The 1963 summer camp scholarship program has been adopted by the session of First Presbyterian Church of Troy. The program will run from Oct. 7, 1962 to May 5, 1963.

Children from the 4th through 12th grades will be eligible for the scholarships which will be awarded on the basis of attendance, classroom participation and behavior.

Children in the 4th-8th grade must participate in at least one church activity per week, suited to their age group. Those in the 9th-12 grade also are required to participate once per week in activities and must be church members by May 1, 1963.

## Summer School Subject of Report By 2 Directors

Highlight of the Birmingham Board of Education meeting last week was a report on the elementary and secondary summer school program.

It was presented by James Liddle, elementary teacher and director of the elementary summer program, and Charles Buell, secondary teacher and director of the secondary summer program. Roger Lindroth, speech correctionist, briefly reported on the summer education program.

In their presentations, Liddle and Buell stated that although summer school has traditionally been and is programmed for the student to makeup work, the current concept of offering advanced and enrichment courses is gradually growing.

This provides the student with an opportunity to have more time during the regular school year to elect additional subjects without interrupting his regular school year schedule, they noted.

A second driver training range, currently under construction at Seaholm High School, is expected to eventually result in an annual saving of about \$25,000 to the district, they reported.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the Board approved the sale of the remaining \$2,415,000 in school bonds, which are used to finance the school building program. This is the remaining amount of the \$4,915,000 bond issue approved by the voters in the November, 1961 millage election.

THE BIRMINGHAM School System has recognized that by offering students an opportunity to take academic and non-academic subjects, the student is better able to expand his field of knowledge than is possible within the regular school year, they said.

The summer school program reached an all-time high enrollment of 4,000: 500 elementary children, and 900 secondary students. In addition, 540 students were enrolled in driver training.

Liddle stated that 33 Birmingham public school teachers participated in the elementary program. He noted that 20 percent of the 560 students were enrolled in enrichment courses taking the courses for the first time.

LIDDLE briefly reviewed the development of the elementary summer school program.

He stated that when the program began in 1950, there were 100 students enrolled in a remedial program.

In 1962, the program was expanded to include arithmetic and typing and the enrollment totaled 397 students. This year, additional enrichment courses were included.

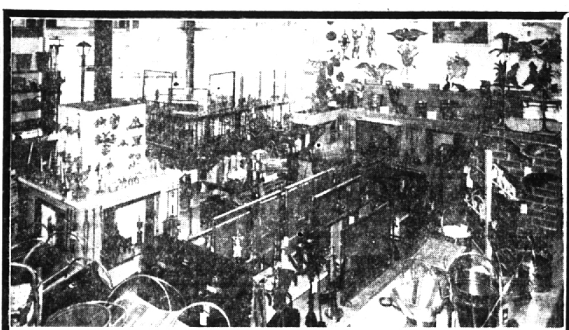
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
