Barons Rout Clarkston; Look Toward Northville

Bloomfield Hills, their sights set on becoming champion of the Wayne - Oakland conference, started league play Friday by running around, over and through Clarkston, 35-0. Scoring their second victory in a row the Barons scored in every period.

Tomorrow night at 8 p.m. the Barons will take on Brighton on the Brighton home field. Coach Don Hoff, in somewhat of a surprise move, switched all-league halfback Roger Stewart to the quarterback slot to start the Clarkston contest.

STEWART, who scored 100 points last season, made the switch with no trouble at all and got the Barons their first touchdown on a 17 yard pass to Tom Melrose at 5:21 of the first quarter. Stewart decided to run the extra point over himself.

Clarkston took the ensuing kickoff and in nine plays marched to the Barons 21 where they ran out of steam and Bloomfield took over on downs.

With 1:01 left in the first stanza Pete Vidler banged over from the one yard line to score for Bloom-

Cranes Down Groves in '62 Opening Tilt

Cranbrook came up with the right plays at the right time and won in downing a game Groves eleven, 19-6.

Quarterback Dick Mosher and halfback Dave Schultz provided the explosive punch for Cranbrook, accounting for all the Cranes' points.

Except for two costly errors by Groves the score might have been reversed. The Falcons lost the ball on a fumble early in the game while pushing for the Cranbrook goal line.

"THAT SCREEN pass we dropped later in the game was costly, too," said Groves Coach Jim Kinnesson. "There was nothing but open field in front of the receiver."

However, Kinnesson was well pleased with the overall performance of his team. He had special praise for halfback Lloyd Lewis, who picked up 131 yards as a receiver on pass plays and 34 more on the ground.

Lewis also scored the Falcons' lone touchdown on a pass from Bill Stephenson that covered 87 yards. Schultz chalked up the first Cranbrook score early in the first quarter when he latched on to a 15-yard pass from Mosher in the end zone. He also kicked the extra point.

ACCOUNTING FOR the two other touchdowns was Mosher with a 40-yard romp off tackle and down the sideline and a four-yard run around left end.

Cranbrook mentor, Pete Slater, pointed to Win Conrad, Pete Maxwell, Larry Willey and Bill Powell as standouts in the line play, both on offense and defense.

Offensive-wise, he praised Mosher and Schultz, his "big guns" and L. B. McKeeloy, making his debut as full back after being switched from end.

The Barons made it 20-0 in the second period on a 16 yard toss from sophomore quarterback James Miller to all-conference end Bill Calhoun. This time Stewart kicked the extra point.

HOFF WAS especially happy with the Bloomfield passing attack. He noted that over the past few seasons the Barons had been primarily as a running ball club and therefore the foot defense had been set for them.

Country Day Swamped by Southgate

Country Day will meet Whitmore Lakes tomorrow afternoon in Beverly Hills in what appears to be a more even contest than the 47-0 shellacking last week at the hands of a strong Southgate team.

"This game will be a contest and not a rout like the Southgate game," predicted Coach Dick Anderson. "It looks pretty much like a tossup."

The third quarter Bloomfield touchdowns came late in the period on a romp by Bill Barnes. Stewart again kicked the point after.

THE 185-POUND tackle made like a fleet halfback as he raced down the sidelines and into the end zone for the counter. Bill Barnes added the extra point.

Fumbles and penalties hurt the inexperienced Clarkston eleven. They lost the ball four times on fumbles and were penalized 60 yards.

Bloomfield bobbed the ball only once and recovered their own misc take. They were also penalized 60 yards but it had little effect on the Hills attack.

THE BARONS picked up 111 yards on the ground and another 53 via the passing game. Clarkston was able to gain only 40 yards on the ground and 25 yards by air.

Don Stallworth continued his fine punting with three boots averaging 39 yards.

The next Bloomfield home game will be Oct. 5 against defending Wayne-Oakland champion Northville.

Seaholm Surprises Royal Oak, 13-0

Seaholm proved without a doubt Friday night that they have a top-notch football team at the West Lincoln Avenue school.

The Maples paced by a group of pile-driving backs and hard tackling linemen stunned an overflow crowd at Royal Oak Kimball as they downed the Knights, 13-0.

The victory was the second in a row for Coach Carl Lemle and his crew. The defeat was Kimball's first since the final game of the 1960 season when crosstown Dondoro whipped the Knights.

It was the first Eastern Michigan tilt of the young 1962 campaign and served quick notice that the Maples will be the team to beat.

THE WIN ALSO moved Seaholm into the number ten spot in the weekly Associated Press poll.

This was the first time in many years that Birmingham has been ranked.

Bloomfield Hills was also ranked in the state-wide poll. The Barons

Carried the ball to the Kimball four in three plays. The Maples then called again on the 240 pound Conley and the hairy fullback plunged through the middle for the score. Brent Miller's attempt at the extra point was no good.

Kimball came right back and moved the ball from its own 10 yard line to the Seaholm five in just ten plays.

Then the Maple defensive, paced by Conley, stiffened. Twice Conley broke through and dumped Kimball owners for losses that put the ball back on the 17 yard marker.

WITH A LITTLE over a minute to go and a third down situation

ended. Early in the second quarter Kimball halfback Dennis Granzow fumbled and an alert Jack Harvey recovered for Seaholm on the Royal Oak 18 yard marker.

Although the victory over Kimball was a big stumbling block in the Maple path the way is still not cleared. Tomorrow night the Maples take on a stubborn Hazel Park eleven on the Parkers home field. The kickoff is slated for 8 p.m.

THE KIMBALL game more than pleased Lemle, but the Seaholm headman expressed concern over the lack of depth on the squad.

FOUR MAPLES were forced to play the full 48 minutes and a serious injury to any of the starters could mean a lot of trouble for Birmingham.

Mike Prieer, Mike Conway, John Slater and Gage Cooper went the distance for Seaholm.

The two teams played on even terms in the first stanza although Kimball did reach the Maple 20 yard line before the defense stiff-

ened. The Knights got a bit panicky and tried a field goal. Steve Wilson's boot fell far short of the mark.

Seaholm took the kick to start the second half and put the ball in play on their own 18.

Staying on the ground the Maples picked up four first downs and ended up with the ball on the Kimball 35 yard line.

Then Maple quarterback Jim Foster uncashed a beautiful aerial to end Bob LaMarre who took the ball away from two Knight defenders and fell into the end zone. This time the boot by Miller was between the uprights and Seaholm moved out in front 13-0 with 5:10 left in the third period.

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Rice Edges Visitation For First League Win

Brother Rice managed to stave off a last-minute scoring attempt by Visitation Sunday and edged the Detroit team 14-13.

It was a nip-and-tuck battle all the way and the sentiments of the Warriors were summed

up by their head coach, Paul Maloney:

"This one was too close for comfort. I hope we don't play another one like that for awhile."

Position in the final seconds of the game pushed Visitation from a potential scoring position on the one, back to the Brother Rice 25-yard line.

BROTHER RICE took the opening kickoff and moved 48 yards in seven plays for the first score. Quarterback Paul Jagels went the final 15 yards and halfback Dale Carrio went in for the extra point to put the Warriors in front 7-0.

Visitation surged back into contention with a 60-yard kickoff return by Jim Corcoran, left halfback, that placed the ball on Brother Rice's 20-yard line.

John Scott, Visitation quarterback, sneaked across the goal from one yard out. A pass for the extra point fell incomplete and at the end of the first stanza Brother Rice led 7-6.

In the second quarter it was Jagels scoring again—driving over from the one—and eliminating a 44-yard drive by the Warriors. Fullback Church Schaefer drove—over left tackle for the point.

A 14-YARD end sweep by Mike Miller late in the second quarter accounted for Visitation's other touchdown. Scott made the point after with a one-yard plunge.

The Warrior coach praised Jagels for his outstanding work on offense. The quarterback, who amassed 66 yards in ten tries, left the game during the third quarter when he suffered a pulled shoulder muscle.

Maloney speculated that Jagels might miss the clash with Mt. Carmel Sunday at Groves Field.

DEFENSIVE STANDOUTS for the Warriors were linebackers Dan Van Mourik and Bob Miller, Maloney said.

The coach commented on the upcoming game with Mt. Carmel: "They might be a little bigger than us, but we expect to beat them," he said. "At least we're optimistic."

Both teams boast a 1-1 record. Brother Rice lost its opener to Our Lady of Lourdes 21-13.

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
