
# **Bud Guest Visits Godfrey**

ship and worked with the Citizen's Library Study Council as well as many other organizations and per-sons.

AMONG HIS recommendations AMONG HIS recommendations was an enlargement of library services and facilities through a library district appro ach that would utilize a library authority. He also stressed the inequity of financial support and recommended that areas outside of Bi aningham participate more fully in this respect.

Wezeman also said the surroundwezeman also said the surround-ing area and Birmingham itself would benefit if a district devel-opment were secured.

WEZEMAN indicated that neither Birmingham alone nor any one community in the area could support library services of the scope needed. The library system idea, he said, "should be sold not on the basis of less library service dollars, but rather on the basis of more return for the library dollar spent."

Spent."

Long range plans included three additional buildings built on a staggered time schedule at three different sites. These should be constructed in keeping with increased population pressures and with increased financial support.
