Donald Watkins for two trustee posts.

Incumbent justice of the peace Robert F. Scott and Christian F. Powell and Arthur Rubiner will face each other for Scott's post as GOP candidates in the primary. The single opening on the board of review will provide a primary race between Republicans John N. Doherty and Ward E. Sanders. Joseph D. Nethew is the only man listed for constable.

TWO SIX-YEAR openings on the library board in West Bloomfield involve no contest to incumbents Mrs. Laura Jane Benton and William J. Devers Jr. and Carol H. Sader is the only candidate for a two-year unexpired term on the library board.

The three Citizens' Party candidates in West Bloomfield are Rosner, Devers and Mrs. Sady. The remainder are running on the GOP ticket.

IN THE CITY of Southfield voters will narrow a field of 12 council candidates down to 10 in order to set the slate for the spring election. Three of the posts are for four-year terms, one for two-year and the remaining opening is for an unexpired term, ending March 31, 1965.

The incumbents are O. David Edwards, John J. Hollywood, Thomas Rowley, Clarence A. Durbin and Alex C. Perinoff.

THE OTHER COUNCIL candidates are James J. Julian, William Lee Reeves, James E. Wells, Elizabeth Molnar, Will J. Oltzer, Jean McDonnell and Tom P. Saks.

A spring election race is indicated between incumbent Mayor James Clarkson and current Council President Hugh Dohany for the two-year post. Incumbents Pat Flannery, clerk, and Clara Lane, treasurer, are unopposed for reelection to their two-year terms.

ALTHOUGH THERE will be no primary in Southfield Township, the following candidates filed for office in what promises to be a token election in April.

They are incumbents Hugh G. Alletton Jr., supervisor; Fanny Adams, clerk and Audrey S. Leach, treasurer. For two trustee posts, those filing are incumbent Albert H. Gattard and D. Carlton Bell. Justice of the peace Theodore J. Sura will seek reelection. Other candidates are Arnold W. Peterson for board of review and incumbent Robert B. Bell for constable.

In the three townships, the offices of supervisor, clerk and treasurer are for two-year terms; trustees, board of review members and justices hold four-year terms. Both constables and highway commissioners hold two-year terms also.

March 11 ballot at which time electors may decide the financing of both the village and county road program, Cline said. The council hopes to take action at its Jan. 7 meeting to put the matter on the ballot.

### Lathrup

The city administrator, Jerard Stone, said that work will continue on possible multiple dwelling zoning on 12 Mile Road and on rezoning of land along parts of 12 Mile and Southfield roads to a business type of zoning.

City officials are working on plans for a municipal building, still in the developmental stage, and hope to get federal aid to improve the water system and to eliminate dead ends in it.

Storm sewer construction will be completed in 1963, Stone said.

### Franklin

No major projects are planned for the coming year, as far as is known at this time, Mrs. Elsie Garwood, village clerk said.

### Bingham Farms

Haskell Wright, council president, said the only major project on the horizon for the village would be participation in the Rouge Valley trunk arm of the Evergreen sanitary sewer interceptor, involving both Bingham Farms and the City of Southfield.

Oakland County DPW Director R. J. Alexander said construction probably will begin in early summer. The arm will be routed from Eight Mile Road through the Rouge Valley to 12 Mile Road and will service both the village and the west part of Southfield.

### Wood Creek Farms

The village is not planning any major project at this time, Mrs. Alice Billu, village clerk said.

### Oakland County

Widening of parts of Southfield Road through portions of several area communities is scheduled to take place in 1963. Other portions of Southfield and 14 Mile roads may be widened, pending action in Beverly Hills which may put the matter of financing the road program on the spring ballot.

The county hopes that the widening of 14 Mile, west from Southfield Road through Beverly Hills, can get under way in 1963. The project requires action both from Birmingham and Beverly Hills; the former city is also waiting to see what action the village will take.

Widening of Southfield Road from 13 to 14 Mile Road is also dependent on Beverly Hills action. Other parts of Southfield Road, however, are set for widening in 1963. Work will begin in the spring on this road, from 9 1/2 to 12 Mile. Bids were let in July of 1962 for this portion of the county program, but delays in Lathrup planning led to a postponement of the work over the winter months.

Work on Southfield Road from 12 to 13 Mile is scheduled to begin sometime this summer with bids to be let some time before that.

Southfield Road from 9 1/2 to 13 Mile runs through the City of Southfield and Lathrup.

## Mackie Announces Matching Funds for Road Construction

The apportionment of federal during the fiscal year starting July 1, an increase of \$531,000 or 6.8 per cent and county secondary roads was announced today by State Highway Commissioner John G. Mackie.

Mackie said Michigan will receive \$8,318,348 in federal funds for secondary road construction an agreement made by Mackie

with the County Road Association in 1967. The state's 83 counties will receive \$5,212,020 compared to \$4,689,481 last year, an increase of 11.1 per cent.

"This means the entire increase in Michigan's apportionment will go to the counties," Mackie said. Each county road commission must match the federal funds on a 50-50 basis and may be used for construction purposes only. The money is allocated to the counties on the basis of land area, population and road mileage.
