## 4 Injured, 1 Critically, In Area Crash

One person is in critical condition and three persons are in fair condition at William Beaumont Hospital following a four-car collision shortly after noon Tuesday at the intersection of Telegraph and Northwestern highways in Southfield.

In critical conditions is Mrs. Delbert Brundage of Flint. She suffered multiple facial cuts and fractures, a broken right leg and internal injuries.

In fair condition are her husband and two passengers in their car, Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Anderson of Excelsior, Minn.

BRUNDAGE has broken ribs and chest injuries; Anderson, facial cuts and fractures; his wife, a broken left hip.

Also injured but treated and discharged from Beaumont Hospital were Bernard Wilson, 21, of Detroit; his brother, James, 27, Detroit; a passenger in their car, Manuel Gutierrez, 28, Detroit; Mrs. James Kohler and her daughter Jeanne, 18, North Branch.

Involved in the accident, but not injured, according to police were James Kohler, 44, of North Branch and Ray Comb, 57, of Southfield.

POLICE SAID that apparently Brundage's car, headed south on Telegraph, was slowing or had stopped for a red light at the intersection of Northwestern and Telegraph when the car driven by Bernard Wilson struck it from behind.

As a result, the Brundage car was knocked into the intersection where it collided with the right side of a station wagon driven by Kohler, police said.

The Kohler car, which had been headed northwest on Northwestern Highway, was in turn thrown into the oncoming lane by the impact where it collided with the car driven by Comb, according to police.

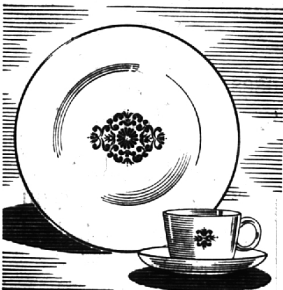

and with the best lighting available.

THE FIRST day's testimony was generally devoted to routine matters such as the identification of the body and the manner in which it was found.

Wayne County Medical Examiner Dr. Edward S. Zawadzki said the exact time of death could not be pinpointed. He testified that the latest Mrs. Thomas could have died was 3 a.m. but that she could have succumbed several hours earlier.

Recorder's Judge Arthur J. Kosinski would not allow the doctor to testify to the earliest time Mrs. Thomas died because that time was set by an assistant medical examiner who might be called to take the stand at a later date.

ANOTHER prosecution witness, Mrs. William Breech, of 1885 Lone Pine, Bloomfield Hills, testified that she was a witness to an auto accident involving Thorson the morning his mother-in-law's body was found.

Mrs. Breech, daughter-in-law of former Ford Motor Co. board chairman Ernest R. Breech, said she first saw Thorson's car about 200 yards ahead of her on Quanton Road.

"The car had been driving along normally when suddenly it swerved over the center line, then went back into the right-hand lane, over a ditch, up an embankment, then back across the road where it struck a guard rail, 'head-on,'" she said.

SHE TESTIFIED that the driver (Thorson) got out, leaned over the guardrail for an instant, then took several steps and fell face forward onto the dirt and gravel road shoulder.

She said that two truck drivers came along and helped Thorson while she ran to find a telephone to call police. When she returned to the accident scene, something had been placed under Thorson's head and a cloth had been put on a cut on his head, she related.

Silverman has not yet revealed the significance of the accident but was expected to do so Wednesday morning.

Well, let's thwart the squirrels and feed the birds:

- a. Put a sheet metal cone under the feeder. Fix it so it will tilt if master squirrel is smart enough to grab hold of the run. The tilt will thwart him.
1. Thwarting squirrels:
  - b. Cover the pail with Tangle foot. This he won't like.
2. FEEDING BIRDS:
  - a. A mixture of grains and sunflower seeds will attract most birds (including squirrels)
  - b. If you use just sunflower seeds you will see no sparrows.
  - c. A good suet cake will attract downy and hairy woodpeckers as well as chickadees, nuthatches, etc.
  - d. Bird feeders of almost any-kind (wood, plastic, metal) are acceptable to most birds.
3. Current things to be considered as most useful for the six weeks ahead:
  - a. FIREWOOD—We take orders for this.
  - b. FIRE QUETS—
    - For fireplaces with grates
  - c. FIRE GEMS—
  - d. KINDELE—LITE LOGS—for starting fires without kindling.
  - e. BARBECUE GRILLS for the BEST steaks.
  - f. BRIQUETTES for use in (d)
  - f. SNOW PUSHERS:
    - Steel—3.25
    - Aluminum—4.20
  - g. SNOW SHOVELS:
    - Steel—2.75
    - Aluminum—3.00
