

# News Events in Birmingham Area

**Issue of July 5**  
Only three of seven Birmingham commissioners showed up at the meeting—no meeting for a quorum—and the meeting lasted about one minute. The only two official actions taken were roll call and adjournment.

Tentative approval of a tap-in of \$312 for water connection in the proposed South Berkshires water extension system was voted by in Beverly Hills, pending a check of the figures involved.

Robert Marshall, Ann Arbor bookstore owner, was appointed interim minister of the Birmingham Unitarian Church. He succeeded Rev. Lester Mordale who resigned. The Marshalls continued to live in Ann Arbor since the Birmingham position required only two days of his time.

Official salute to summer, traditionally marked by the Fourth of July, signaled local country clubs to swing into gear. Emphasis was placed on sailing, swimming, tennis and golf.

Birmingham Bloomfield Hills riders, led by Alison and Rick Cran, Debbie Willson, Sue and Peter Foley, and Mrs. Graham J. Graham on a day's practice, strongly felt in the winners circle last week at the Detroit Horse Show. Miss Cran, National FFA dressage champion, captured five blue ribbons and finished third four times.

**Issue of July 12**  
Sidney T. Eder, of 444 Bryn Mavr, Birmingham, was one of five trucking contractors charged with criminal conspiracy in an alleged Detroit DPW graft racket. "There's nothing to the whole rickshaw," Mrs. Eder told The Eclectic.

A two-car collision in Bloomfield Hills resulted in one death and injury to three others. Killed was A. Dickinson, 27, of Avon. The injured were James W. Hamilton, 27, Oakland Township; Anthony F. Czank, 24, East Detroit; and Beverly Quinlan, 25, St. Clair Shores.

Bob, Cathy and Joanne Shelton, 3560 Woodclate Ct., Birmingham, financially "adopted" the Knudsen String Quartet, a Chinese boy in Hong Kong, through Foster Parents' Plan. The foster parents proposed to contribute \$15 a month toward the child's support for at least one year.

The finest golfers on the PGA tour in Michigan are competing for a \$35,000 purse in the 11th annual Motor City Open golf tournament at Knoolwood Country Club. The classic ran July 12 through the 15.

Edmund B. Barnes, of 4700 Pickering, Bloomfield Township, was elected vice president in charge of sales for Kelvinator division of

American Motors Corp. He had been English at Michigan State for 26 years.

**The Issue of July 19**  
The Bloomfield Hills School Board made no change in its policy of permitting teachers to offer non-sectarian prayers in school classrooms. The board, which had indicated that it would ban prayers in the classrooms, reversed its decision during the early part of 1967.

Construction began on two buildings for the new St. Owen's Roman Catholic parish in Bloomfield Township. Total cost of the buildings, including a combination church-school hall and the other a rectory for housing the clergy, was estimated at \$200,000.

Thomas Fitzsimmons, of 264 Catalpa, Birmingham, author, poet and associate professor of English at Michigan State University (Oakland), was granted a Fulbright lectureship to two Japanese colleges. He will study at Tokyo University and at Tsuda College.

The 1962 Birmingham Junior Chamber of Commerce golf tournament at North Hills Country Club on July 23 was expected to draw such illustrious line-ups as Jack Nicklaus, Phil Rodgers, Gene Latta, and a host of other top players.

The opening of the first Birmingham area branch of the Michigan Bank and the election of a new township man, John William Butler, to the board of the bank were announced by Stamford C. Stoddard, president. The bank is located near Maple and Sabler.

**Issue of July 26**  
The Michigan Supreme Court ruled that the reapportionment amendment of the state constitution was invalid under the "equal protection" clause of the 14th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution. The court ordered the state legislature to reapportion the senate by Aug. 20, according to the number of inhabitants in each county by the most recent U. S. census.

A profit of more than \$3,000 was reported from the Birmingham Art Festival in June. The festival grew to greater importance in Michigan cultural circles in 1967; committee heads reported in a meeting held in July.

Birmingham was among 22 Michigan cities receiving a Pedestrian Safety Citation from the American Automobile Association (AAA) for having gone one full year without a pedestrian death. **Issue of Aug. 9**  
In a light turn-out of voters, Republicans out-pollied Democrats in traditionally Republican Oakland County in Tuesday's election. Republican George Romney of Bloomfield Hills outdrew Democrat John B. Swainson, 35,114 to 16,414, in the county.

Meager clues were all Southfield police had to go on as they continued a search to track down for teenage drag racers whose search for thrills caused the death of a Southfield patrolman, Donald I. Harding, last week.

**Birmingham's Recreation Department** staged its first "Community Night" at the White House by Mrs. John Kennedy, Miss Snyder is a dancer and Miss Buchbinder plays the violin. Both are students at the Intelecho Music Camp.

The Birmingham American Legion baseball team lost two of their last three games and finished third in the eight-team league, which was won by Southfield. Reports circulated throughout Oakland County that the board of supervisors would abandon the idea of building a jet airport on its land northeast of Pontiac.

**Issue of Aug. 16**  
George Romney, the Republican candidate for governor came home to campaign. In a news conference with Oakland County reporters at a Bloomfield Township restaurant, Romney said he would stress the leadership theme in his bid for the state's highest office.

A \$25,000 bond issue was sold and a \$455,584 construction bid formally awarded to expedite the storm water sewer program in Oakley Village. The action was seen as the last step in ending pollution of the River Rouge. Pickets marched at Orchard

Lake Country Club, the eighth Detroit-area club to be struck by the Hotel and Restaurant Employees and Bartenders International Union. Forty members of the local club left their jobs Saturday, forcing cancellation of a dance.

Don Martin, director of the Birmingham department of Recreation, said the 1962 recreation program "was the most successful summer we have had, due to the enthusiastic staff, the large percentage of return of our better employees from previous years, and hard work of specialists and supervisors."

The expanded summer school program of the Birmingham Public Schools reached an all-time high enrollment of 1,490 this year. Some 500 elementary children and 930 secondary students attended the sessions. About 540 students were enrolled in driver training.

**Issue of Aug. 23**  
Jacobson's newest store, a shop for men, opened its doors at 305 N. Woodward. The one-story structure at Woodward and Willis one housed the Birmingham Arthur Murray Dance Studio. The store was the sixth Jacobson's shop to open in Birmingham.

George Romney, Republican, and John Swainson, Democrat, candidates for governor, scheduled a series of face-to-face debates on three Detroit television stations. Their wives accepted an invitation from Channel 7 to tell "Why my husband should be elected governor."

The Knudsen String Quartet made its debut in the Birmingham - Bloomfield Hills area. The concert was held on the terrace of Cranbrook House, overlooking the beautiful Cranbrook gardens. Knudsen chose works by Haydn, Tansman and Dvorak.
