

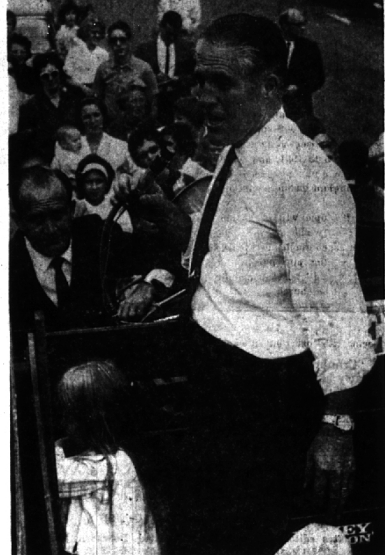
Pictorial Highlights of a News-filled Fall, 1962



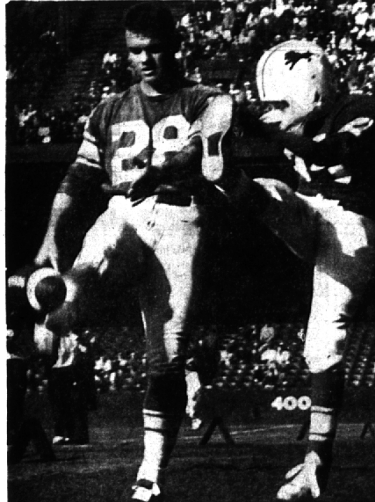

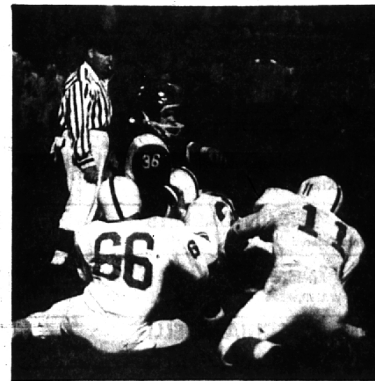

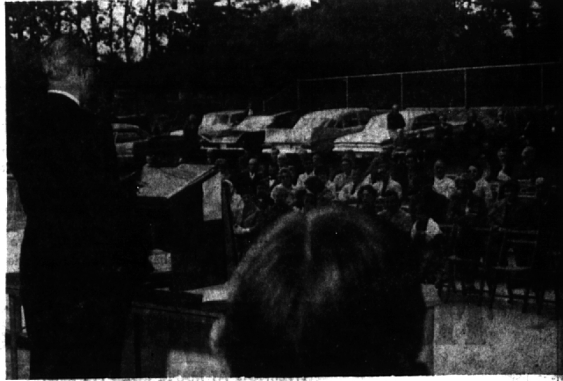
